The President's Message

In studying the history of the Georgia High School Association we find that each year has brought new problems, and that these problems have been met with courage and have been solved through the loyalty and cooperation of the members of the Association.

This year is no exception. New problems have arisen which must be solved. Through the dismissal of the University High School Inspector and Miss Lucille Epps with no replacements, the office maintained by the University for the use of the High School Association has been abolished. Your executive committee has met and discussed the details of the State Basketball Tournament and of the State Meet. Invitations have been extended for these events and a committee appointed to study the situation.

You will notice in the bulletin that where in the past you were requested to write the office at the University for certain types of information that all questions of this sort will now clear through the office of the State Secretary.

A committee, composed of H. M. Tarpley, Washington, Chairman, C. W. Peacock, Lafayette, and S. F. Burke, Thomaston, appointed to study the rules of the Association and to make recommendations at the meeting in May, made a very fine report at the annual meeting. Through the adoption of a number of these recommendations, your president believes that a long step forward has been made.

Supt. R. W. Dent, Clarkston, was asked to head a committee to study the problems of officiating in this state with particular reference to basketball. Due to the fact that the other members named to the committee were called to the Army, most of the work fell to Mr. Dent. He has made an exhaustive study of this question and has made a report to the State Executive Committee. Every member school is urged to cooperate in this plan when it is presented at the Fall Meeting by the District President.

I want to urge each member to study this bulletin containing our constitution and by-laws. Through an understanding of the aims of the Association we will be better fitted to carry on its work. Let us each see to it that our school carries out these rules in the letter and spirit of the law, remembering that we are assisting in the development of our boys and girls.

Finally, may I take this opportunity to express my deep appreciation for the cooperation given me during the past year, to thank the committees for their splendid work, and to ask for your continued support in the solution of our Association problems.

FROM THE SECRETARY'S DESK

Classification of Schools. Previous to this year schools have been classified on the basis of their enrollment. This year the classification will be based on the Average Daily Attendance. The figure turned in as of July 1st to the State Department of Education will be used to classify the schools for the coming year.

Dates for Basketball Tournaments. The dates for the various district basketball tournaments (boys) have been set one week later than last year. Attention is directed to the final date, Feb. 25th, by which tournaments—this includes divisional playoffs—must be completed.

Filing of Entries. There is a tremendous mass of clerical work necessary to conduct a State Tournament or a State Meet. Delay in filing entries causes a delay in completion of plans for the meet and usually adds to the expense by requiring use of telephone or telegraph to secure necessary information. Filing of entries early will materially assist the State Office.

Date for Payment of Dues. The date for the payment of dues without penalty has been set for October 1st. District Secretaries are due to make their reports by October 15th. Heretofore a school which was late in payment of dues could not obtain membership during the year. Now a school may qualify by paying the penalty for a delayed payment.

Football Section. A social section has been added for football. Football conferences have been organized in various parts of the State in the past. Recognition is given these organizations with the hope that it will encourage the formation of additional conferences. Under the football section are a number of new items. Most of these will not go into effect until the season 1942-43. One of the most important changes is the requirement that a boy must have had a minimum of two weeks practice before he

may engage in a football game.

The Interscholastic Football Rules have been adopted, effective 1942-43. There is very little difference in the two codes. Several changes have been made recently in the Intercollegiate code tending towards the Interscholastic rules. The interscholastic rules tend to give the player more protection. The adoption of the interscholastic rules will be of great advantage to those schools of Georgia who play schools in Florida and Alabama as these states operate under interscholastic rules.

Basketball Section. A special section has been added for basketball. The Interscholastic Rules have been adopted effective this year. This will cause no difficulty as the Intercollegiate and Interscholastic rules are written by the same group, and there are very few variations. A plan for the training and developing more basketball officials will be put into operation this fall. A comprehensive study of the problems has been made. A special committee composed of outstanding school men who are actively engaged in coaching and officiating has been placed in charge of this work. Clinics and Interpretation meetings will be held in various parts of the State with the idea in mind of developing more uniform and more efficient officiating. This committee is composed of: R. W. Dent, Clarkston, Chairman; R. E. Lee, Elberton; Y. T. Sheffield, Plains; Drane Watson, Wrens; Harold McNabb, Albany.

Precision Basketball. The 16 mm. film, "Precision Basketball," can be secured from the State Office. The only cost for the use of this film will be the transportation charges both ways.

District Meet Dates. The dates for the District Meets have been set for April 24th and 25th. Reports of these meets are due to be in the hands of the State Secretary by April 27th.

Quartet. This event has been added as a District and State Event.

Track. A change has been made which will permit entry into the State Meet of those contestants who may tie for first place in any track or field event. This means that if three boys should tie for first place in the high jump in a given district that all three boys would be entitled to enter the State Meet. In the past it has been the custom to split the points and toss a coin to see who entered the State Meet.

Section 4, Item 8. This is a very important change. It is essential that each school read and study this section.

Migrant. This rule has caused trouble ever since it was first adopted.

The rule has been rewritten entirely. Please study it carefully and if there is any question in your mind about it, take the matter up with your vice-president in charge of eligibility.

Class A Age Limit. The Class A schools have recommended that the 20-year age limit apply to Class A schools effective 1942-43. This recommendation has been adopted by the State Executive Committee.

Invitation Tournaments and Meets. There has been considerable confusion as to the regulation governing Invitation Tournaments and Meets. A general summary will be given below. Complete details may be found in the Bulletin.

Invitation Tournament or Meet Confined to One District. Requires the approval of the District Committee in whose area the tournament or meet is to be played.

Invitation Tournament or Meet Involving more than One District (Inter-District). Requires the approval of the District Committee in whose area it is to be played before it can be brought to State Committee.

Requires approval of State Committee.

Teams entering from other districts than the one in which it is to be played must have the approval of their own district committee before entering.

Interstate Tournaments of Meets. Requires sanction of the tournament or meet by the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations. Requires approval of the Georgia State Committee before Georgia teams may enter.

State Basketball Tournament for Girls. The Georgia High School Association regulations do not permit Girls' State Basketball Tournament.

Constitution

ARTICLE I—Name of the Organization

This organization shall be known as the Georgia High School Association.

ARTICLE II—Object of the Organization

The object of this organization shall be the promotion of education in Georgia from a mental, physical, and moral viewpoint; to promote the study of public speaking; to standardize and encourage athletics; and to promote appreciation for music, home making and other cultural arts through District and State Contests.

ARTICLE III—Membership

Sec. 1. **Schools Eligible for Membership**—The Membership of the Georgia High School Association shall consist only of schools that are accredited by the Georgia High School Accrediting Commission.

Sec. 2. **Grouping of Membership by Size**—The membership of the Association shall be divided into three groups, as follows:

Class A, composed of eligible private boarding schools and eligible high schools with an A.D.A. of 800 or more.

Class B, composed of eligible high schools with an A.D.A. of between 125 and 799 students.

Class C, composed of eligible high schools with an A.D.A. of less than 125 students.

Sec. 3. **Grouping, How Determined**—The classification of schools into various groups shall be based on the Average Daily Attendance (A. D. A.) secured from the State Department of Education as of July 1st annual report. The A.D.A. of July 1st shall determine the classification of a school for the following school year.

Sec. 4. **Grouping of Membership by Districts**—All schools shall be members of a district organization in the Congressional District in which they are located, with the exception of the Class A schools which form the District-at-Large.

Sec. 5. **Colleges**—Junior Colleges and preparatory departments of colleges are ineligible for membership in this Association.

Sec. 6. **Junior High Schools**—Junior High Schools are ineligible for membership in this Association.

Sec. 7. **Transfers from Districts**—Any eligible school which is located near the border of a district and because of its location wishes to be transferred to membership in a neighboring district, may do so on consent of the District Committees from both districts and the

state president, provided no rules are violated otherwise, and provided the transfer of membership is made before October 1st.

Sec. 7. **Membership in Another Association.** A school is ineligible for membership in the Georgia High School Association if it is or becomes a member of any association whose Constitution and/or By-Laws conflict with those of the Georgia High School Association.

ARTICLE IV—How Governed

Sec. 1. **State Officers.** The State officers of this Association shall consist of a President, a Vice-President, and a Secretary-Treasurer. These with each District President shall form the State Executive Committee. The President of the University of Georgia or someone designated by him to represent the University, and the State High School Inspector shall be ex-officio members of the committee.

Sec. 2. **District Officers.** Each district shall elect a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary-Treasurer, and three other committeemen who shall be from Class B and C in proportion to the number of member schools from each class, no two shall be from the same school. These officers shall compose the Executive Committee in their district.

Sec. 3. **Duties of Officers.** The duties of the various officers and committees shall be those usually devolving upon such officers and committees. It is specifically the duty of the State Executive Committee and the District Committees to seek at all times to educate the school officials under their jurisdiction concerning the Constitution and By-Laws of this Association, and at the same time to check vigorously any practice or violation of the rules by exercising the full penalty for such violations, if it seems necessary.

Sec. 4. Election of Officers.

(a) A President, a Vice-President, and a Secretary-Treasurer shall be elected as State Association officers for the next school year at the annual meeting of the Georgia High School Association in May of each year at the time of the State Meet at the Friday morning session. Only each District President or his representative and other members of the State Executive Committee shall vote.

(b) A President, a Vice-President, and a Secretary-Treasurer and three committeemen shall be elected as officers for each district at any Spring Meeting. Each member school shall have only one vote.

(c) Vacancies occurring on a committee shall be filled by the committee until regular election time.

Sec. 5. **Authority.** All questions of eligibility, or of any other matters subject to investigation, must first be submitted to the District Vice-President, who shall make a ruling thereon after hearing the evidence of both sides. If either the defendant or the plaintiff is not satisfied with this decision, appeal may then be made to the Dis-

trict Executive Committee. In the event that the District Vice-President fails to act within one week, an appeal may be made direct to the District Executive Committee either through the President or the Secretary. After hearing the evidence submitted by both sides, the District Executive Committee shall render a decision in the matter. If either party is still dissatisfied with the decision, or if the District Executive Committee fails to act within one week, appeal may then be made to the President of the Georgia High School Association, who shall hear the evidence of both sides and render a decision. If either party is still dissatisfied, either party may then appeal to the State Executive Committee, provided the party or parties appealing shall pay the entire expenses of the State Executive Committee when called together for this purpose. The State Executive Committee shall then hear the evidence of both sides and render a verdict. This last appeal shall be final and anyone seeking redress through any other channel shall forfeit the membership of their school in the Georgia High School Association for one year. No other method of appeal shall be held valid, and any appeal made must begin with the first step outlined and not eliminate any step until reaching the final court of appeal, the State Executive Committee.

Sec. 6. **Vote.** Each school shall have one vote in a District meeting and each District shall have one vote in a State Executive Committee meeting through its President or officer next in line. If no officer of a district attends the State Executive Committee meeting, the District President shall have the power to appoint some school man from the membership of his district to represent him in this particular meeting.

Sec. 7. **Amend the Constitution and By-Laws.** It shall take a two-thirds vote of the State Executive Committee to amend the Constitution. A majority of votes shall be required to amend the By-Laws. Changes shall not go into effect until the beginning of the next school year. Any proposed changes in the Constitution must be submitted to the State Secretary in writing by March 1st. These proposed changes shall be submitted by the State Secretary to each District President not later than April 1st.

Sec. 8. **Annual Meeting.** The Georgia High School Association shall meet in executive session each year at the time and place of the State Meet, at such an hour in such a conference room as the President may designate.

Sec. 9. **Suspension of a School.** The District Executive Committee has authority to suspend any school under its jurisdiction from membership in the Association on sufficient evidence of violation of the rules of the Association, with the provision that the suspended school may appeal in the manner prescribed in Article IV, Section 5, except that the appeal must be made directly to the State President from

the decision of the District Committee. The penalty may be fixed as suspension for the remainder of the playing season and for forfeiture of games or events won, and/or the suspension from membership for twelve months, at the discretion of the committee.

ARTICLE V—General Provisions

Sec. 1. Fall Conferences:

(a) There shall be held in each Congressional District, each year, early in October, a conference of school executives of all schools of Classes A, B, and C, for the purpose of studying the rules.

(b) There shall be held in each district in October or November a meeting of all member schools in Classes A, B, and C, at some time and place designated by the President of the G.E.A., and the President of the District, for the purpose of discussing educational problems.

Sec. 2. Reports:

(a) The Principal or Superintendent of each members school shall make reports to the District Secretary at the times prescribed by the By-Laws and in the manner called for, and also such other reports as may be called for by the District Committee.

(b) The President of each District, or his representative, shall make a written report of the financial condition of his district organization, and of all activities in his district, naming champions in football, basketball, track, if any be declared by the District Committee, and all other district activities, to the State Executive Committee at the annual meeting held at the time of the State Meet.

(c) All reports of a District Secretary to the State Executive Committee concerning entries in the State Basketball tournaments, and the State Meet or concerning any routine matter pertaining to the Georgia High School Association, shall be addressed to the State Secretary. These reports shall be filed in the office of the State Secretary for future reference. It will not be necessary at any time for an individual school to make a report to this office as all reports must come from the District Secretary to the State Secretary.

Sec. 3. Contests. Each district may hold annual contests in reading, declamation, music, debate, spelling, essay, home economics, athletics, and other forms of contests which may be authorized by the State Executive Committee, calculated to promote the cause of education, on a date in April to be announced in this Bulletin under the rules governing the State and District Meets. Schools in Class A may enter the literary contests of Class B schools, by paying the fees set by the District Committee, but must conduct their own athletic meet. Winners in these district contests may be sent to the annual State Meet both in athletic and literary events.

Sec. 4. Treasurer. The Treasurer of each district is required to make an itemized statement of the income and out-go of all funds to the District Executive Committee. The State Treasurer is required to make a similar statement to the State Executive Committee. When a new Treasurer is elected, any balance in cash or bank account must be turned over to the new officer immediately.

Sec. 5. Office. The permanent office of the Georgia High School Association shall be the office of the State Secretary-Treasurer. From this office shall be sent out bulletins, debate handbooks, and all other routine blanks and forms. Requests for such material shall be addressed to the State Secretary. Remittances for debate handbooks and debate handbook supplements shall be sent direct to this office. The person in charge of the State Office shall have charge of making all arrangements for holding and conducting the State Meets and Tournaments.

By-Laws

Sec. 1. A student is eligible to represent his or her school of all classifications unless otherwise noted, in interscholastic contests:

- Item (1) Who is a regular student taking four units of work.
- Item (2) Who is passing at least three units of work.
- Item (3) Who is not a special student.
- Item (4) Who has earned at least three Carnegie units last year in school.
- Item (5) Who was properly registered within 15 days of the beginning of the semester or quarter in which the event takes place.
- Item (6) Who is an amateur.
- Item (7) Who is not playing on a school team and some other team during the same period of time.
- Item (8) Who has made up enough deficiencies so that he or she is passing in at least three subjects, provided no student shall be allowed a re-examination within seven calendar days after failing in two or more subjects. Also, no subsequent examination shall be given within seven calendar days after failing on any re-examination.
- Item (9) Whose department satisfies the requirements of the school authorities.
- Item (10) Who has not earned 16 Carnegie high school units. (Exception for Class A Boarding Schools, see Section 5.)
- Item (11) Who is not a four-year high school graduate. (Exception, Class A Boarding Schools, see Section 5.)

- Item (12) Who has not played four years of high school competition in that sport or event.
- Item (13) Who has not yet attained his or her twentieth birthday. (This does not apply to Class A Schools until 1942-43 school year.)
- Item (14) Who is not a migrant student of less than a year's standing.

Sec. 2. A school to be eligible to participate in interscholastic contests in this Association:

- Item (1) Shall be a member of the Georgia High School Association.
- Item (2) Shall be an accredited four-year high school.
- Item (3) Must pay the annual dues of \$5.00 per year to the District Secretary-Treasurer. Dues are due and payable October FIRST. Dues paid after October First will carry a penalty of 25c per day for each day late. It is the responsibility of the individual school to see that the dues reach the District Secretary-Treasurer on time.
- Item (4) Shall be governed by person or persons who believe in fairness and honesty, an evidence of which shall be the strict observance of all rules and regulations in regards to eligibility of contestants representing their school.
- Item (5) Must not have been disqualified as a member school for violation of the Constitution or By-Laws within one year.
- Item (6) Shall employ no one to coach who is not a fulltime teacher, certified by the State Department of Education, and receives his or her entire pay from the Board of Education that employs him or her. (A coach not employed by the Board of Education but who lives in the community and earns his living in some other manner but gives his time to the school is strictly in violation of this rule.)
- Item (7) Must abide by all rules of the State organization and also the District organization when the rules of the District organization are not in conflict with the rules of the State organization.
- Item (8) Shall play no independent team or teams of schools not a member of this or some allied organization, except college freshmen, and then not in football. (Exception, member schools may schedule and play Junior High Schools as they so see fit in as much as Class D has been eliminated.)

- Item (9) Must make out complete eligibility papers and forward TWO copies to the District Secretary before the first contest of the year in that sport. Each game played prior to the filing of TWO copies of eligibility list with the District Secretary, shall be forfeited.
- Item (10) Must make out complete eligibility papers and exchange with competing school at least three days before each contest.
- Item (11) Shall allow only one football game per week by the same team, on the season average, and only two games per week in baseball by the same team, except in tournaments.
- Item (12) Shall allow only two basketball games per week by the same team. (Exception, tournaments.)
- Item (13) Shall allow no basketball team to play more than thirty basketball games during the season. (This includes tournaments.)
- Item (14) Shall allow its basketball team to enter only one tournament. (The State Tournament is construed to be a continuation of the District Tournament in which a team participates.)
- Item (15) Shall allow no student to switch from one team to another so as to engage in more than one football game per week or two basketball games per week.
- Item (16) Shall provide strict physical examination by a competent physician of each and every contestant at the beginning of each season in each sport.
- Item (17) Must fill out the blanks prepared by the State Executive Committee provided for the District Meet one week before that event and forward same to the District Secretary.
- Item (18) Shall not enter any inter-district basketball tournament unless such entry is approved by the District Executive Committee.

Sec. 3. Each District organization, through its Executive Committee, or proper official, or in general session:

- Item (1) May pay its Secretary-Treasurer a salary of \$50.00 or more a year.
- Item (2) Shall pay \$2.00 per member school to the State Treasurer as dues by OCTOBER 15th. Any district report that is late shall be assessed 25c per calendar day fine for overdue reports. It is the responsibility of the District Executive Committee to see that the report is filed on time. This report shall not be considered as complete unless it is accompanied by the

- properly filled out forms furnished to the district secretaries.
- Item (3) Shall collect and pay 5 per cent of the gross receipts of all basketball tournaments held within the District to the State Treasurer within five days after the close of the tournament, these funds to be used to defray the expenses of the State Association. (Exception, any basketball tournament confined strictly to schools in the same county and held after the District tournaments have been completed, shall not be liable for 5 per cent of the gross gate receipts.)
- Item (4) Shall provide suitable medals and trophies for individual winners and cups or banners for winning schools in District competition.
- Item (5) May assess sufficient fee for District Meet entrants to pay expenses of judges, printing, etc., and expenses of delegates to the State Meet.
- Item (6) Shall play girls' basketball under girls' rules and on a two-division court.
- Item (7) Shall allow no tournament in which member schools participate to be held in its territory except on permission of the District Committee and on the assurance that the tournament will be conducted according to the regulations of this Association. Penalty for violation of this rule is found in Article IV, Section 9, of the Constitution and By-Laws.
- Item (8) Shall make such rules as may be necessary to successfully operate the District organization, provided the rules are not in conflict with the rules of the State organization.
- Item (9) Shall determine the place or places for the District Meet and basketball tournaments, provide for admission fees, division of funds with local school, and other details necessary for the successful operation of the Meet and tournaments.
- Item (10) Shall, through its Secretary, certify as to the winners in the District basketball tournament ten days before the State Tournament, and as to the winners in all events of the District Meet ten days before the State Meet, to the State Secretary. Eligibility of contestants as well as the names of the school they represent shall be included in the report. The full name of each contestant shall be given.
- Item (11) (a) Schools having an agricultural department are permitted to have F.F.A. basketball teams and to

hold tournaments, provided the rules and regulations concerning the eligibility of students and the conducting of tournaments as outlined in the By-Laws of the Georgia High School Association are strictly observed. The District Committee in whose area the school is located and where the tournament is held shall have jurisdiction concerning any matter pertaining to eligibility or the tournament. (b) Schools that are not members of the the Georga High School Association, but that have an agricultural department, may be permitted to participate in games or tournaments conducted for or by F.F.A. basketball teams, provided the principal or superintendent of the non-member school shall apply to the District Committee for permission to play and agrees to abide by the rules and regulations concerning eligibility of students as outlined in the By-Laws of the Georgia High School Association.

- Item (12) Shall determine if schools within its District may enter any approved inter-district tournamets.

Sec. 4. The State organization through its Executive Committee or proper official:

- Item (1) Shall pay its Secretary-Treasurer \$200.00 per year salary.
- Item (2) Shall provide an adequate place for the State Basketball Tournament and the State Meet.
- Item (3) Must provide an official receipt for all dues and fees received from District Treasurers so that they may submit proper showing for all monies handled by them to the District Committee at end of the year.
- Item (4) Shall pay the State organization officials five cents per mile, one way, as traveling expenses when on official business.
- Item (5) Shall determine if any Inter-District or State Tournaments shall be allowed and determine the place or places where they shall be held. No Inter-District tournament shall be authorized unless such tournament has been approved by the District Executive Committee in whose district the tournament is to be played.
- Item (6) Shall provide eligibility blanks to each and every member school in sufficient quantities to supply their needs for the year. These blanks shall have spaces to include the name, exact date of birth, grade, and number of years on team not including this year, for each individual on a team.

- Item (7) Shall not allow a State Girls' Basketball Tournament.
- Item (8) Shall determine in June or any subsequent date what approved contests shall be held during the coming year. All contests of whatsoever nature are forbidden in all member schools, where such schools enter into contests with other schools for prizes or awards unless the sponsor of such contest shall first secure the approval of the State Committee to hold such contests. Member schools who enter such unapproved contests are to be punished the same as for any breach of the rules of the Association.

Sec. 5. All Class A schools shall be governed by the same rules as other schools, with the following exceptions:

- Item (1) A graduate of an accredited high school or a student who has earned 16 or more Carnegie high school units may represent a Private Boarding School when playing another Private Boarding School.
- Item (2) Class A schools may play college freshmen or junior colleges in any sport desired.
- Item (3) The definition of an amateur, though prescribing that a student cannot accept compensation for his athletic services or ability, does not mean that he cannot accept a scholarship to a school which will cover his actual school expenses and thus enable him to secure an education.
- Item (4) A student who has not attained his twenty-first birthday is eligible to represent a Class A school. (This exception will automatically be eliminated in 1942-43 when the twenty-year limit goes into effect.)
- Item (5) Any Class A school of the Georgia High School Association that fails to postmark eligibility blanks containing information required by the Georgia High School Association to the District Secretary by October 1st shall be suspended from the Association for one year effective on the day of the District-at-Large Meeting about December 1st of that year. All games won or lost during the season shall be defaulted. Contracts for other contests between the suspended school and other Georgia High School Association Schools shall be abrogated for the duration of the suspension. The District Secretary shall instigate proceedings against the offending school.
- Item (6) An exception to the migratory rule shall be made to allow public high schools of Class A to play Private Boarding Schools of Class A under conditions agreed

uopen by the schools concerned. (This exception does not apply when public high schools of Class A are playing each other and when any Class A school is playing a Class B or C school.

- Item (7) Class A Boarding Schools which are members of the Mid-South Association will be permitted to enter any tournaments or meets conducted by that Association in accordance with its rules and regulations.

Sec. 6. Definitions:

- Item (1) An amateur is defined as one who has never violated his or her amateur standing by receiving money, tuition, board, gifts worth more than \$10.00, or pay of any description as compensation for playing on an athletic team, or playing under an assumed name. (Note: To receive any of the above will be interpreted as subsidization and no other view will be accepted.)

- Item (2) A unit of work is a course of study for which one Carnegie unit will be allowed if completed.

- Item (3) Interscholastic competition in this Association is interpreted to mean engaging in contests with member-schools only, or with college freshmen in all sports except football. Inter-scholastic competition with non-member schools is forbidden.

- Item (4) Migratory Rule—Any pupil who changes school is a migrant pupil. A migrant pupil must remain in a school to which he or she has transferred one full calendar year before he or she may become eligible. Students from accredited and/or non-accredited high schools and/or students from Junior high schools attending schools other than the one to which they are assigned by the County or City Board of Education are migrants, unless and until they are made eligible by one year's attendance.

A student who transfers from a member high school to a private or boarding school or from a private or boarding school to a member high school is not eligible until after one full calendar year of enrollment has elapsed after transfer. A student who transfers from one high school to another because his parents move or transfer their residence is eligible in the high school of his parent's residence provided he meets all other requirements.

- Item (5) Registration means the enrolling of a student in any manner.

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- Item (6) A **Special Student** is a person taking work in a school which does not carry credit in terms of Carnegie units; or, one who is repeating work already passed; or, a person who is allowed special privileges and is not required to fulfill all duties that pertain to a regular or normal student.
- Item (7) A **school year** is defined as attendance in a high school for a period of 20 days or more, provided the student has not participated in any competitive interscholastic contests; or, as attendance in high school one day if the student engages in some interscholastic contest on that day.
- Item (8) A **year's play** constitutes the entering of competitive play in a sport by a student in any manner, either as a substitute for just one play or more; or, the playing of the entire season as a regular player on the team.
- Item (9) A **quarter** shall be considered a period of three months, during which time a student may not earn more than two Carnegie Units.

State and District Meet

LITERARY EVENTS

Sec. 1. The State Executive Committee and each District Committee, working under the rules and regulations set out in the Constitution and By-Laws of this Association, shall have entire charge of the operation of their respective meets, the selection of judges and officials for each event. They shall:

- Item (1) Provide a time-keeper, whose duty it shall be to keep an accurate account of the time each contestant is consuming and to stop the contestant at the end of the time allotted for any given event.
- Item (2) Provide one or three judges for each event, and give the judge or judges a written copy of the rules concerning the judging of that event as set out in section and item dealing with the particular event.
- Item (3) Provide programs for each contestant so that they may know where and when to appear for a contest.

Sec. 2. In all State Literary Contests in which there are more than two contestants, a rating system of judging will be used so that conference of judges to determine winners may be eliminated.

Sec. 3. Each of the following contests shall be judged on merit according to points set out as essential for judging that contest. The age or size of the contestant shall have no influence in reaching a decision.

Item (1) **Declamation.**

The declamation is a contest of delivery. It should be an oration worthy of a high school pupil. The subject matter of the declamation should be serious in tone and delivered for the purpose of informing, convincing, and persuading the audience. All purely funny pieces, dramatic readings, and impersonations are barred from consideration. No accessories such as costumes or music will be allowed. The judges will take into consideration the following: (1) sincerity, (2) earnestness, (3) force, (4) voice, (5) polish, (6) grace, and (7) effectiveness of delivery.

The declamation shall not be over six minutes in length. The judges shall select a first, second, third, and fourth place winner.

Since many of the hackneyed orations of the past have failed to stimulate effective speaking it is urged that this contest deal with some vital current topic. Certainly the subject matter should be of vital interest to the young speaker, and better still, each speaker should make his own cutting and write out his own introductory sentences.

Item (2) Reading.

Selections for this contest will be taken from State Adopted English Books. The contestant shall be given her selection at the State or District Meet and shall be given 30 minutes to study selection, and then be required to read the selection before an audience. Class B and C will read from the same group of selections. The judges shall select a first, second, third, and fourth place winner.

Item (3) Piano.

Each contestant must play (1) BACH TWO PART INVENTION No. 4 or No. 14; (2) Any shory composition of HAYDN or MOZART or BEETHOVEN not exceeding three minutes time of actual playing; (3) and one selection from the following:

- SCHUBERT-LISZT—Hark! Hark the Lark!
- MENDELSSOHN—Spinning Song
- SCHUMANN—Arabesque
- CHOPIN—Mazurka in c sharp minor
- ~~SINGING~~—Serenade
- PALMGREN—May Night
- HODGSON—Ichauway Dance
- PROKOFIEFF—March (Love of Three Oranges)
- LECUONA—Cue of the Spanish Dances
- TOCH—The Juggler

The judges will take into consideration the following: (1) accurary of text; (2) musicianship; (3) interpretation; (4) rhythm; (5) phrasing; (6) shading; (7) dynamics, and (8) position while playing.

The judges shall select a first, second, third, and fourth place winner.

Item (4) Violin. (State Contest Only)

Each contestant shall play the following:

1. CORELLI—Adagio and Allegro (Edited by Herman) Schirmer Publisher.
2. SCHUMANN—Nachtsuck Op. 23, No. 4.
3. Any composition of own selection (not exceeding four minutes time of playing.)

The judges will take into consideration the following: (1) accuracy of text; (2) accuracy of pitch; (3) musicianship; (4) interpretation; (5) rhythm; (6) phrasing; (7) shading; (8) dynamics, and (9) position while playing.

The judges shall select a first, second, third, and fourth place winner.

The contestants in violin must be certified to the State Meet through the District Secretary.

Item (5) One-Act Play.

Each district shall hold elimination contests on or before the District Meet, the winning play of which shall be entered in the State Meet. No more than eight persons may be used in a cast, although

parts may be doubled. Plays dealing with religious or immoral subjects will receive no consideration by the judges. The District Secretary must file an official entry for the play winning the District first place with the State Secretary at the same time as he makes his report to the State Secretary for the winners of the District Meet. Failure to do this will disqualify the district from competition in this event. No play shall be more than 30 minutes in length.

The judges shall select a first, second, third and fourth place winner.

The scoring of points shall be ten points first place, six points second place, and two points third place.

Plays winning first place in each group at the State Meet are eliminated in both groups for a period of two years. The following plays are barred for the current year in District and State Meets:

"MOLLY O'BRIEN"

"THE HAPPY JOURNEY"

"TWO CROOKS AND A LADY"

"WHAT GRANDMOTHERS KNOW"

Item (6) Essay Contest—Boys and Girls.

(a) Subjects and Contestants: The State President shall select two subjects from high school English, and three from "Current Topics (National or Georgia) discussed in newspapers and magazines as basis for the Essay Contest. For 1942 the English subject will be based upon some selections and authors found in the literature books on the State Text Book list. The Georgia subject will be some phase of developing worthy citizenship in Georgia. The national subject will be upon some phase of the problem of vitalizing democracy. The international subject will be some phase of the United States- European, United States-Latin America relations.

The subject must be sent in a sealed envelope to the District Secretary, said seal to be broken in the presence of the contestants, after having assembled in the room for the contest. The contestants must receive no coaching during the contest.

The contestants, one boy and one girl from each school, may write upon any one of the five subjects selected, an essay not exceeding 600 words. The essay shall be written in ink. Two hours shall be given for writing the essay.

(b) How judged. Verbal and grammatical correctness, spelling, and punctuation shall be considered of less importance than the interest and general effectiveness of the whole composition, but should have weight. The essay shall be judged by the thought, the order, arrangement, and by the elements of style. It is a ready writers' contest and evidence of pre-memorized compositions shall weigh heavily against the contestants. Boys' and girls' essay will be graded separately and separate awards will be given. The judges shall select a first, second, third, and fourth place winner in each.

(c) Essays Sent. The first place essays for each district shall be

sent by the District Secretary just as handed to the committee of the District contests, with name on separate sheet, to the State Secretary at the same time he makes his report to the State Secretary for the winners of the District Meet, instead of having the pupils come to the State Meet.

Item (7) Spelling Contest—Selection of Words.

(a) The State Secretary, on or about the first day of April each year, shall send, securely sealed, to the District Secretary as many lists of words as the District may have schools entering the contest. The list will consist of 100 words to be spelled by the senior class of said schools on the first Wednesday in April. A minimum of 80% of the words will be selected from the spellers on the State Textbook list; the remaining words will be selected from current news publications.

(b) How Conducted. The District Executive Committee shall appoint for each contesting school a visiting examiner to conduct the contest in each school, said examiner being a superintendent (or his representative) of some member school. The District Secretary shall send by registered mail to each respective examiner at the post office where the said examiner is to go, the sealed list of words, with the instructions on the envelope: "To be held until called for." The visiting examiner is directed to select two assistants from the faculty in the school where the examination is being held to assist him in the conduct of the examination. The local spelling teacher may give out the words to the class.

Definitions of words may be given. The examiner shall make a written report of the result of the examination, signed by all members of the committee. It shall be sealed and mailed to the District Secretary on the same day on which the examination is held with all the examination papers of the class, together with such written explanations of absences as may be submitted to him. No excuse for absence other than a doctor's certificate will be accepted, except in the case of extraordinary providential hinderance, such as death in a family or some similar circumstance. One hundred words must be counted off for each unexcused absentee.

The District Secretary must notify the State Secretary by Monday of the last week in March what schools in the district will enter the spelling contests. Every examination not held according to these rules and regulations shall be thrown out.

(c) Winning papers. The District Committee may review the list sent in. The District Secretary shall send to the State Secretary the averages of all schools in his district and the papers of the winning schools. The District or State Secretary shall from these data award first, second, third, and fourth places according as to whether it is a District or State Contest.

Item (9) Debate.

Each school must notify the Secretary of the District Committee not later than February 25th of its intention to enter the debates for the current year. The District Secretary shall group the schools entering according to geographical arrangements or conditions of highways connecting the schools by March 10th and notify each school entering concerning the groupings. Each school so grouped shall present two teams of debators each, one team on the affirmative and one team on the negative, the affirmative team debating at home and the negative team away from home. Where schools drop out consolidations are to be made by the Dist. Secretaries, and schools must be ready to meet any assigned contestants on the final date. Should all schools but one in a circle fail to debate, that school shall be declared the winner and be entitled to represent the school at the District Meet. If only two schools remain, these debate on the dual plan, each team sending a negative team to the other school.

Any school entering debate and dropping out without giving three days notice to the District Secretary shall not be allowed to enter any other literary event that year.

(a) Order of Speeches. At all contests, time and order of speeches shall be as follows:

Main Speeches

First affirmative speaker.....	10 minutes
First negative speaker.....	10 minutes
Second affirmative speaker.....	10 minutes
Second negative speaker.....	10 minutes

Rebuttal Speeches

First negative speaker.....	4 minutes
First affirmative speaker.....	4 minutes
Second negative speaker.....	4 minutes
Second affirmative speaker.....	4 minutes

Speakers on respective sides must speak in the same order in rebuttal as in main speech.

(b) Question: The question for debate for 1941-42 is: "Resolved: That Every Able-Bodied Male Citizen in the United States Should Be Required to Have One Year of Full-Time Military Training Before Attaining the Present Draft Age."

The High School Association has on hand at the office of the State Secretary 250 Debate Handbooks at 40 cents each and 110 copies of the Debate Handbook Supplement at 65 cents each. These may be secured by remitting the above amount to the State Secretary.

(c) Judging and scoring. In every debate there shall be three judges. A copy of the instructions as given below shall be given

to each judge. In selecting the winners each decision shall count 1, and the vote of each judge shall count 1, a perfect score making 8 points. All of the preliminary debates in the several districts shall be held on the fourth Friday in March, at such hour as may be agreed upon, and in case of a tie, the tie must be settled by the following Friday. Both teams of the winning school in each circle will be entitled to contest at the District Meet and the school scoring the most points will be declared the winner. Should there be a tie in points scored by each school at the District Meet, it shall be decided by lot which school shall represent the District at the State Meet. Each school winning in the District shall send two teams, one affirmative and one negative to the State Meet.

(d) Instructions to Judges. A copy of the following instructions shall be given to each of the three judges: "The judges, who shall sit apart during the debate, shall judge the contest as a debate voting without consultation 'Affirmative' or 'Negative' on the merits of the question irrespective of their individual opinions as to the merits of the question. In deciding which team has done the most effective debating, the judges shall take into consideration:

1. Argument, by which is meant the substance and value of the proof offered and its skillful use in the discussion, and not the mere number of points.
2. Rebuttal, by which is meant impromptu argument used to refute the direct argument on the opposing side as made. New evidence may be submitted, but new argument is forbidden. A marked difference in the style of rebuttal speeches and those of the direct argument is a sign of poor preparation.
3. Effectiveness, by which is meant the combination of good English with pleasing delivery.
4. In case of doubt, argument shall be stressed relatively more than delivery and rebuttal work more than main speeches, consideration being given to the directness of the rebuttal and the non-use of manuscripts. At the close of the debate each judge shall indicate his choice by ballot and deliver it to the presiding officer who shall inspect the ballot in the presence of a representative of each school and announce the decision."

(e) No Visiting. It will be considered dishonorable for pupils, teachers, or followers of one school to visit the debaters of another for the purpose of securing information when the two schools are likely to meet on the same question.

(f) Coaching. Coaching is necessary, but does not mean writing speeches. Coaching shall be limited to (a) instruction in the art of debating in general; (b) help in the collection of material bearing on the question; (c) advice, suggestion, direction, criticism, outline and English as in regular class work; (d) drill on delivery. The coaching

must be done by a teacher of the school and not by outside parties. Every school will observe these general principles of honesty for the sake of the pupils.

At least three days before the debate the coach of each team shall sign and send to the principal of the opposing high school the following statement: "I hereby certify that to the best of my knowledge the preparation of the argument for this debate has been the work of the members of my team who will participate."

(g) In all contests the debators shall be separated from the audience and shall receive no coaching while the debate is in progress.

(h) Teams. The teams constituting the debating team from a given school may not change from one team to another or change from negative to affirmative, or vice versa, in order to give the school a stronger representation on that side of the debate. Each school must be represented by the same debators or an alternate, at the District or State Meets, that represented the school for the first circle debate and on the same side of the question that they originally represented.

(i) At the State Meet, the Debate Committee shall arrange the district winners into two circles of five schools each, these to be designated as Circle No. 1 and Circle No. 2. The winning school in Circle No. 1 shall meet the winning school in Circle No. 2 for the State Championship. In case of a tie between schools in the same circle before the circle winner is determined, the schools tied shall debate off the tie, each school furnishing two teams. Both teams of the winning school in each circle will be entitled to contest in the final debate, and the school scoring the most points shall be declared the winner. Should there be a tie in points scored in the final debate, a co-championship will be declared.

Item (10) **Quartet.**

In both District and State Meets each quartet will be limited to six minutes. Not more than three selections may be presented by each quartet. A quartet may be composed of male, female, or mixed voices.

Sec. 3. **Points Towards Winning Literary Cup.**

(a) The winners in declamation, reading, boys' essay, girls' essay, piano, home economics, quartet, and spelling shall receive seven points for first place, five points for second place, three points for third place, and one point for fourth place towards winning the literary cup in both District and State Meets.

(b) The winner of the dual debate at the District or State Meet shall receive ten points and the loser shall receive six points towards winning the literary cup. Each school not going to the final in the District shall receive points up to five, according to the number of points received in the preliminary contest in debate. Each school not going to the finals in the State Meet shall receive points up to five, according to the number of points received in the circle debates.

(c) One Act Plays at District or State Meet shall receive ten points for first place, six points for second place, and two points for third place.

Sec. 4. Number of Representatives.

No student may represent his or her school in more than two events and spelling in the literary events at the District Meet. Each school may have only one contestant in each of the following: Declamation, reading, piano, home economics, girls' essay, boys' essay.

Sec. 5. Training.

There are no restrictions in regards to training of students for any literary event unless noted in directions dealing with this contest, but the school authorities have the final responsibility for naming the contestants to represent their school.

Bessie Tift Scholarship Award

Bessie Tift continues the scholarship award for District and State winners in reading. The plan of award is that the winner of first place at the State Meet receives a \$400 scholarship, or full cost for four years. The second place winner in the State Meet receives half this amount. First place winners in each district receive \$100 scholarship which is divided over two years and the second place winners in the District receive half that amount.

Brenau Scholarship Award

Brenau College is again offering to the winners of each district piano contest a scholarship for one year, valued at \$100, and to the winners of the State Contest additional scholarships of \$300 toward paying for their musical education at Brenau.

Art Contest

The Art Department of the University of Georgia in an effort to promote interest in Art in the state, offers the fourth annual art scholarship exhibition contest. The winner of this contest will be awarded a tuition scholarship to the University of Georgia amounting to \$122.50. The event is to be held during annual state high school meet.

One alternate and four honorable mentions will be awarded. An exhibition of the contestants' work will be shown at the new Fine Art Building during the meet. The exhibition is open to high school juniors and seniors of member schools of the Georgia High School Association and should a junior win, the scholarship will be held over for one

year only.

Each contestant is limited to two pieces in any medium. All work must be original and any medium may be used. All drawings and water colors should be matted but should not be framed under glass. Oil paintings may be framed. Any work submitted must be in Athens April 24. Pieces of sculpture should be carefully packed and have proper identification tags attached. Transportation charges both ways must be borne by the contestant. The University cannot assume responsibility in case of damages, fire or theft.

State Events

The State events are ART, VIOLIN, and GOLF. Students are eligible to participate upon certification of the superintendent or principal through the District Secretary to the State Secretary. Points earned in State Events will not count towards winning the State Literary and Athletic Cups. Students participating in State athletic events will be permitted to enter three additional athletic events, including relay.

District Secretary shall certify contestants for ALL STATE EVENTS at the same time he makes his report to the State Secretary for winners of the District Meet.

Entries in STATE EVENTS must be made through the District Secretary. The local superintendent or principal must certify contestants in these events at the SAME TIME as he certifies contestants in the District Meet.

Athletics

TRACK EVENTS

Sec. 1. The N.C.A.A. Track and Field Guide, published by A. G. Spalding Company, Atlanta, Georgia, shall be the track and field guide for Athletic events in this Association, with the exceptions that may be found in special regulations listed below for Classes B and C.

- Item (1) Not over twelve boys may represent a school in track and field contests. Each school may have only one contestant in each event except relay. No contestant may enter more than two events and the relay.
- Item (2) There shall be ten track and field events as follows: 100-yard dash, 12 pound shot put, 220-yard dash, running high jump, 120-yard low hurdles, running broad jump, 440-yard dash, pole vault, discus throw (college weight), half-mile relay (four men). The relay teams in the State Meet may be made up of the representatives from the districts at large, provided each man in the relay is a representative in some other track event.
- Item (3) All ties for first place in the District Meets shall be permitted to enter the State Meet. The points in case of a tie shall be divided equally.
- Item (4) A District Winner shall be declared in the State Meet. The high point cup shall go to the school which scores the most points whether said school is in the winning district or not.
- Item (5) In the shot put, discus throw, and broad jump events the giving of qualifying and final throws is optional. If the District Executive Committee wishes to do so, it may dispense with qualifying trials and allow each contestant in any of these three events only the three trials, only the best of the three trials to count.
- Item (6) The following events shall be held in the order named at District Meets (exception when heats are necessary). 100-yard dash, shot put, 220-yard dash, running broad jump, hurdles, running high jump, 440-yard dash, pole vault, discus, half-mile relay.
 - (a) Suggested order of Events and Time Schedule District Meets:

When heats are necessary:

1. Trials of the 100-yard dash and pole vault.....3:00 p. m.
2. Trials of the hurdles.....3:10 p. m.
3. Shot-put.....3:15 p. m.
4. Finals of the 100-yard dash.....3:30 p. m.
5. Finals of the hurdles and high jump.....3:40 p. m.
6. Discus Throw.....3:50 p. m.
7. Trials of the 220-yard dash.....4:00 p. m.
8. 440-yard dash—finals.....4:15 p. m.
9. Finals of the 220-yard dash.....4:30 p. m.
10. Running broad jump.....4:30 p. m.
11. Half-mile relay.....5:00 p. m.

Item (7) The State Meet will be held on two consecutive days. The preliminary (qualifying) trials will be held the first day and the finals the second day.

Item (8) Four places will be counted in both District and State Meets. First place shall count 7 points; second place, 5; third place, 3; fourth place, 1.

Item (9) State Meet.

(a) In all field events there will be qualifying jumps, throws or vaults. Five men will qualify in each event for the finals.

(b) In the shot put and discus throw each contestant will be allowed four throws in the qualifying session. In the final session each contestant will be allowed three throws. Throws made in the qualifying session will stand for record in the finals.

(c) In the broad jump each contestant will be allowed four jumps in the qualifying session. In the final session each contestant will be allowed three jumps. Jumps made in the qualifying session will stand for record in the finals.

(d) In the qualifying session in the pole vault and the high jump the last five remaining shall qualify for the finals.

(e) Schedule of Events for the Qualifying Session:

1. Pole vault, high jump, and shot put.....2:00 p. m.
(Qualify five in each event)
2. Trials of the 120-yard low hurdles.....2:30 p. m.
(Two heats, qualify the first and second in each heat, and the faster third if five flights of hurdles are used in each heat; if six flights of hurdles are available, qualify first three in each heat.)
3. Trials of the 100-yard dash.....2:40 p. m.
(Two heats, qualify first three in each heat)

4. Trials of the 440-yard dash 2:50 p. m.
(Two heats, qualify first three in each heat)
5. Broad jump (Qualify five) 2:50 p. m.
6. Trials of the 200-yard dash 3:00 p. m.
(Two heats, qualify first three in each heat)
7. Discus—follow immediately after conclusion of the shot put. (Qualify five).
8. Half mile relay 3:15 p.m.
(Two heats, qualify first three in each heat)

(f) Schedule of Events for the Final Session:

1. Shot put, high jump, pole vault 2:00 p. m.
2. 440-yard dash 2:30 p. m.
3. 100-yard dash 2:40 p. m.
4. 120-yard low hurdles 2:50 p. m.
5. Broad jump 3:00 p. m.
6. 220-yard dash 3:00 p. m.
7. Discus (immediately after shot put is concluded).
8. Half-mile relay 3:15 p. m.

(The time schedule for the Final Session is subject to change. In any case the events will be called in the order given and the same time intervals will elapse between events.)

Sec. 2. **Tennis.** Tennis is a District and State event separate from track and will not count for points in winning the track cup in the District or State Meet. The District winners, who will be certified by the District Secretary at the same time as he makes his report to the State Secretary for winners of the District Meet, will be eligible to go to the State Meet. District elimination tournaments will be arranged by the Executive Committee of the respective districts. Tennis requires two players for the doubles and one player for the singles. A boy or a girl may participate in both singles and doubles provided the matches are not played the same day. In the State Meet singles and doubles are played the same day. Four boys will constitute a boys' team and four girls will constitute a girls' team, making a total of four per team from each school. There will be no mixed teams. Four certified players maybe eligible to play in any elimination or final matches at discretion of coach.

Sec. 3. **Golf.** Golf is a State event. It is open to "B" and "C" schools. There will be separate competition for boys and girls. Contestants in Golf must be certified by the local superintendent or principal through the District Secretary at the same time as other contestants in the District Meet are certified. The golf events will be played as follows: (a) Qualifying round for flights; (b) low medal award for low qualifying score; (c) team award on basis of low score team of four in qualifying round; (d) elimination in flights with award to each flight winner.

Sec. 4. 1942 Tournament and District Meet Dates.

(a) The 1942 State Basketball tournament will be played on March 11th, 12th, 13th and 14th.

(b) All District tournament (boys) must have been completed prior to March 1st. Reports of winning teams with eligibility blanks must be filed with the State Secretary not later than March 2nd. (A squad shall be composed of 10 boys and 12 girls.)

(c) All District Meets must be held the weekend of April 24th and 25th and returns filed with the State Secretary by April 27th.

(d) The State Meet will be held on May 7th, 8th and 9th.

(By special action of the State Executive Committee it was directed that a heading for basketball and football be included under athletics. It was further directed that all by-laws relating to basketball be placed under the basketball heading and that all by-laws relating to football be placed under the football heading.)

FOOTBALL AND BASKETBALL**Sec. 5. Football.** (items marked ** are not effective until 1942-43)

- ** Item (1) Member schools of the same classification may form conferences where four or more schools so desire. The schools may meet at a time and place agreed upon and form an association. Each member school shall have one vote in all sessions of the conferences. A schedule shall be arranged where each school of the conference plays each other school at least one game during the season . . . exception, where the conference is large and such a plan would not be feasible then each school must play a representative schedule as recommended by this conference.
- Item (2) Each conference so organized must file with the State Secretary a copy of its Constitution and By-Laws. Each conference must file with the State Secretary a copy of its official conference football schedule.
- ** Item (1) If the schedule is arranged in such a way that a conference championship cannot be determined, one post season football game may be played to determine the championship of the conference.
- ** Item (4) In case of a tie in games won, then the conference may declare the tying teams equal champions of the conference.
- ** Item (5) After the conference schedule has been arranged the member schools may complete their schedules with other teams that are members of the Georgia High School Association or with teams of other states

provided that they belong to their respective state associations.

- Item (6) No school may engage in a football game unless that school has had a minimum of two weeks practice.
- ** Item (7) All football games must be played under the National Federation Interscholastic Football Rules.
- Item (8) A member school shall allow only one football game per week by the same team on the season average. (By-Laws, Sec. 2, Item 11).

Sec. 6. Basketball.

- Item (1) No school shall participate in more than two games in basketball per week (exception—tournament play).
- Item (2) No school may play more than thirty games of basketball with other schools during the basketball season. (This includes tournament games.)
- Item (3) There shall not be a State Girls' Basketball Tournament.
- Item (4) All basketball games shall be played by the National Federation Basketball Rules. (Exception for playoff of tie games in Girls' District Tournaments).
- Item (5) Where two basketball teams have the same color of jerseys it shall be the duty of the home team to change colors in the interest of good sportsmanship. In tournaments where two teams have the same colors, both schools shall change.
- Item (6) The officials in all games shall have complete control over all features of the game. In District and State Tournaments the Committee in charge shall secure the services of a competent scorer. No team shall have the privilege of placing their scorer to check the official scorer at or near the position occupied by the official scorer. Often official scorers are materially hindered by others who call out the numbers of the offending players and otherwise distract the attention of the scorer.
- Item (7) A school may enter its basketball team in only one tournament in addition to the district tournament. (The State Tournament is construed to be a continuation of the District Tournament in which a team participates.)
- Item (8) In as much as girls' rules do not provide for the playoff of a tie game, and since tournament play requires that a winner be determined, the following regulations shall be enforced for playing off tie games in tournaments for girls. "In the event that

the score is tied at the expiration of the regular playing time, after a rest period of three minutes an extra period of three minutes will be played. If the score is still tied, alternate rest periods of three minutes and extra playing periods of three minutes shall continue. The team which is ahead at the expiration of any extra period shall be the winners. Any team which refuses to play off a tie game shall have the game forfeited to its opponent by the referee. Extra periods shall be construed to be continuation of the second half."

- Item (9) A school may permit its basketball teams to enter only such tournaments as have been authorized according to the rules and regulations of the Georgia High School Association.

National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations

CONSTITUTION

Article I—Name

This organization shall be known as the National Federation State High School Athletic Associations.

Article II—Object

The object of this Federation shall be to promote and regulate the interstate athletic interests of the high schools belonging to the various associations and to promote pure amateur sport.

Article III—Membership

Sec. 1. The unit of membership shall be the State Athletic Association. The charter members are Michigan, Wisconsin, Iowa, and Illinois. A new member may be admitted to the Federation:

1. By making application to the Secretary of the Federation through its own officers.

2. By receiving a two-thirds vote of the National Council.

3. By paying into the Treasury such membership fees or dues as may, from time to time, be fixed by the National Council.

Sec. 2. The fiscal year shall coincide with the school year. Membership fees shall be due and payable on September 1st of each year and any state whose membership fees are not paid by the time of the annual meeting shall forfeit its voting privilege in the National Council.

Article IV—National Council and Officers

Sec. 1. The legislative body shall be the National Council consisting of one member from each state association, elected by the executive committee or board of control from its officers or board of control.

Sec. 2. The officers of the Federation shall be a President, a Vice President, and a Secretary-Treasurer, all of whom shall be elected by the Executive Committee. The President and Vice-President shall be elected from among the members of the Executive Committee.

Sec. 3. The Executive Committee shall consist of seven members elected by the National Council from the membership of the Boards of Control of the member states and so chosen as, in a general way, to represent the different sections of the country. The Executive Committee is hereby authorized to determine all necessary expenditures of money and to exercise all the powers and duties expressed or implied in this Constitution and By-Laws.

Sec. 4. The members of the Executive Committee shall be elected at any annual meeting at which a vacancy is apparent, and shall serve for three years each, or until their successors have qualified. Provided, however, that any office shall become automatically vacant at the time of the next annual meeting following the date at which the incumbent of the office ceases to be a member of his State Board of Control.

In the election there shall be: (1) Nominations from the floor; (2) A ballot upon those named and anyone who receives a majority of the votes cast shall be declared elected. If no one receives a majority, the two candidates having the largest numbers of votes shall be voted upon by ballot. If there should be a tie vote, the winner shall be determined by lot.

Sec. 5. The Secretary-Treasurer shall be elected by the Executive Committee for such term as may be determined by the Executive Committee.

Article V—Meetings

Sec. 1. The annual meeting of the National Council shall be held at such place and time as may be determined by the Executive Committee provided that written notice of such annual meeting shall be sent to the officers of each unit member at least 30 days preceding the meeting.

Sec. 2. Special meetings may occur at any time upon the order of the President or upon the call of a majority of the members of the National Council, the call to be issued by the Secretary.

Sec. 3. Each state association shall be represented by the member of its executive committee, or board of control designated for that purpose. In case he is absent any member of the executive committee or board of control who is present is authorized to represent his state. All members of the executive committees and boards of control of the various state associations are authorized to be present at the meetings of the National Council and to participate in its discussions.

Sec. 4. In the transaction of the business of the National Council, each state association shall have one vote.

Sec. 5. A quorum for the transaction of business shall consist of representatives of a majority of the state associations belonging to the Federation.

Article VI—Amendments

Sec. 1. The Constitution and any By-Laws may be amended at any meeting of the National Council by a two-thirds vote of those present, provided the number present shall not be less than a quorum.

Sec. 2. All *proposed amendments to the Constitution or By-Laws* must be submitted to the Secretary not less than sixty days in advance of the annual meeting of the National Council at which they are to be considered and shall be submitted by the secretary to the various executive officers of the member state associations not later than thirty days in advance of the said meeting.

BY-LAWS

Article I—Eligibility of Players

To represent a school in any interstate athletic contest, a pupil must be eligible under the following rules:

Sec. 1. His school must be a member of the state athletic association of the state in which he resides, provided it is eligible to join.

Sec. 2. He shall be an amateur, one who has never used and is not now using his knowledge of athletics or his athletic skill for gain and who has always contested under his own name.

Article II—Provisions Governing Contests

Sec. 1. In all interstate contests the schools concerned shall each follow the rules of the respective state athletic associations to which they belong.

Sec. 2. Schools in state associations belonging to this Federation may engage in athletic contests with schools where no state high school athletic association exists only when each contesting pupil conforms to the following minimum eligibility requirements:

He shall not have reached the age of twenty-one years; he shall not have played on any college or university team; he shall not have graduated from any four-year high school course or its equivalent; he shall be doing passing work and shall have passing credit from the beginning of the current semester in at least fifteen hours of high school work per week and, unless entering high school for the first time, shall have credit on the school records for fifteen semester hours of school work for the last preceding semester during which he attended school 20 days or more.

Article III—Rules Committee Representatives

Sec. 1. The Executive Committee shall be authorized to negotiate with the proper authorities of the National Collegiate Athletic Association with a view of securing adequate active representation for the National Federation on all committees preparing playing rules for those sports in which high school boys participate. The committee shall report back to the National Council from time to time whenever there may be significant outcomes to report.

Sec. 2. In all cases in which such cooperative method of writing the playing rules may be entered into, the Executive Committee shall be empowered to appoint active representatives of the National Federation to serve upon such committees. The term of service for which such representatives shall be appointed shall be two years,* provided that in all cases in which the National Federation shall have more than one member upon any committee the initial terms shall be organized in such a way as to provide for an alteration of vacancies and holdover memberships, to the end that the National Federation representation may be continuous.

*NOTE: Whenever contingencies of travel and expense make it desirable, the Executive Committee may appoint temporary representatives to serve for a single meeting.

Coaches Rule

A school shall not permit coaching by anyone who is not a certified teacher regularly employed by the Board of Education and whose entire salary is paid by that body; or who has fewer than three regular periods of classes, gymnasium, or study hall duty per day.

Sanction

A school shall not enter any meet or tournament involving more than two schools unless it has been sanctioned by the state high school association, and if more than one state is involved, by the National Federation.
