

Important Information As We Begin An Exciting New School Year!

The beginning of a new school year is the most exciting time in a school community. We have the opportunity of making new friends, welcoming new faculty members and students, and fall sports and activities are met with great anticipation. We are off to a great start and I appreciate the opportunity to travel around our state to attend our contests and am grateful for that opportunity.

High school athletics play an important role in our communities and the pride shown in our teams is uplifting. I say with confidence that Georgia has the best high school athletics and coaches anywhere in the nation and the support you receive from your communities is outstanding. I appreciate what you do for our student athletes in providing first class opportunities for them that will last a lifetime.

We have a lot going on at the GHSA and the following are a "Items of Interest" for your information and some things to help the GHSA serve you more efficiently.

• **Eligibility:** There are 371,215 students currently eligible (Form A) for sports and activities at our 463 member schools. We have processed 2,117 transfer students as well. As you prepare Form Bs, please fill out the forms completely and be sure to provide the public school attendance zones for both the sending and receiving schools. This will ensure a shorter turnaround for you to get your athletes participating.



• Hardships: Familiarize yourself with the By-Laws associated with the

hardships process. Keep in mind that the hardship claimed must be out of the control of the student, parents and school. As obvious as this sounds, please indicate what is claimed to be the hardship and provide documentation that supports that claim.

• Football Finals: will be held at the Mercedes Benz Stadium December 7-8, 2018, but if Atlanta United plays in the MLS Cup on December 7 or 8, 2018 our Football Finals will be moved to December 11-12, 2018 at the MBS.

• **Basketball Finals:** will be held at the Macon Centreplex March 6-9, 2019. We are pleased with the new management and the upgrades at the venue. The events held at the Centreplex last year were very successful and we look forward to this year's event.

• **Esports:** We are launching a GHSA sanctioned Esports league in partnership with PlayVS. There will be two seasons, fall and spring. The fall season will feature "League of Legends," the most played PC game in the world. Your school will be able to build teams of five and compete with other schools remotely through the PlayVS online portal. Today, your school can get started in under 15 minutes by visiting PlayVS.com/schools. The participation fee for each student is \$64.00 and the last day to register is October 28, 2018. • Penny Mitchell is administering a great group of students who were selected to GHSA's **Student Athlete Advisory Council** (SAAC). This group of outstanding young people from across our state is providing us with feedback from the student-athlete's perspective. Profanity, degrading remarks, and intimidating actions directed at officials or competitors will not be tolerated, and are grounds for removal from the event site.

Spectators are not allowed to enter the competition area during warm-ups or while the contest is being conducted.

In observance of Breast Cancer awareness, the GHSA will allow member schools to wear "Pink" pink and/or uniforms socks. wristbands, etc., at their HOME events during the week of September 3-8, 2018 for all fall sports (football, cheerleading, cross country, fastpitch softball and volleyball).

And, finally, September 17-22 will be the fifth annual "Blue Week" for Prostate Cancer in the sport of Football only to alert men about "Know Your Score" with regular prostate testing checkups. 2018-19 GHSA Student Athlete Advisory Council

The 2018-19 GHSA Student-Athlete Advisory Council had its first meeting on August 28 at the Georgia Sports Hall of Fame in Macon. The Council is made up of 18 student-athletes from across GHSA's 463 member schools. These students submitted applications last spring and were chosen by a panel who scored their applications based on answers to five questions. Seven of these members are completing their two-year term.

The focus this year for the SAAC is to find ways to improve sportsmanship in their schools and across all member schools. They discussed ways to develop good sportsmanship within their school athletic teams and competitive activities as well as ways to show good sportsmanship to other teams/officials.

They also discussed forming an athletic leadership team within their schools where two members of each athletic team would represent each sport/competitive activity and help teams learn to support each other. Some of these schools already have this in place. Other topics discussed were determining subjects for speakers for the Student Leadership Conference in the spring and working championship events.

Participation Increases for 29th Consecutive Season

INDIANAPOLIS, IN — Led by an additional 15,009 participants in girls sports programs, the overall number of participants in high school sports increased for the 29th consecutive year in 2017-18, according to the annual High School Athletics Participation Survey conducted by the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS).

The number of participants in high school sports in 2017-18 reached an all-time record high of 7,979,986, according to figures from the 51 NFHS member state high school associations, which includes the District of Columbia. The number of girls participating in high school sports reached an all-time high of 3,415,306, and boys participation also set a new standard at 4,564,680.

While the number of additional participants this year (16,451) was not as substantial as the previous year (94,635), a steady increase in several boys and girls sports extended the streak to a record-breaking 29th year.

Among boys sports, soccer registered the largest gain with 6,128 additional participants. Other boys sports with sizeable gains were cross country (3,824), volleyball (3,767) and golf (2,558). For the second consecutive year, competitive spirit had the largest increase among girls sports with an additional 18,426 participants, followed by swimming and diving (4,797), lacrosse (3,431) and golf (3,176).

With 1,035,942 participants, 11-player football remains the No. 1 participatory sport for boys in high school by a large margin. Outdoor track and field is No. 2 with 600,097 participants, followed by basketball (551,373), baseball (487,097), soccer (456,362), cross country (270,095), wrestling (245,564), tennis (158,151), golf (144,024) and swimming/diving (138,935).

Outdoor track and field continues to lead the way for girls with 488,592 participants, followed by volleyball (446,583), basketball (412,407), soccer (390,482), fast-pitch softball (367,861), cross country (223,518), tennis (190,768), swimming/diving (175,594), competitive spirit (162,669) and lacrosse (96,904).

Despite remaining the top participatory sport for boys, 11-player football dropped for the second consecutive year. The decline in numbers, however, was not as high as 2016, and participation in 6-player and 8-player football continued to trend upward. In 2017, participation in 11-player football was 1,035,942, a two-percent decline of 21,465 from the previous year. The decline from 2015 to 2016 was 27,865, or 2.5 percent.

While there have been some recent reports about schools dropping the sport of football for the 2018 season because of declining numbers, the overall number of schools discontinuing 11-player football before the 2017 season was minimal – a decline of 20 schools from 14,099 to 14,079.

With 14,079 schools sponsoring 11-player football nationally, the loss of 21,465 participants amounts to 1.5 per school. And, although the 11-player numbers were down, the number of schools sponsoring 6-player football increased



from 259 to 317, and school sponsorship of 8-player football increased from 841 to 847. Overall, the number of high schools sponsoring football (combining 6-, 8-, 9- and 11-player) increased by 29 schools – from 15,457 to 15,486.

The overall number of participants in football (6-, 8-, 9and 11-player) in 2017 was 1,067,970, which includes 2,401 girls playing the various levels of the sport. The 21,465 decline in 11-player participation was evenly distributed across the country with no states reporting significant drops in football numbers.

"There are many positives about the numbers in this year's sports participation survey," said new NFHS Executive Director Karissa Niehoff. "First, the upward trek of interest in high school sports continued for the 29th consecutive year. The model of sports within the educationbased school system continues to thrive in the United States.

"Second, we are encouraged that the decline in high school football has slowed due, in part, to our efforts in reducing the risk of injury in the sport. While there may be other reasons that students elect not to play football, we have attempted to assure student-athletes and their parents that thanks to the concussion protocols and rules in place in every state in the country, the sport of football is as safe as it ever has been."

Amazingly, this year's survey indicated participation by high school students in 65 different sports, as well as 13 adapted sports for students with disabilities. Some of the more popular non-traditional sports were badminton (17,898), archery (10,460) and fencing (4,513), along with two relative newcomers – bass fishing and ultimate frisbee.

The participation survey has been compiled in its current form by the NFHS since 1971 through numbers it receives from its member state associations.
