The President's Message

Dear Friends:

The time has come in Georgia for us, the coaches and administrators, to do some serious re-evaluation of our athletic program. It is necessary for us to get our purposes and goals into the proper perspective and go forward from there. The coach more than any other person who works with youth can contribute towards building character.

Occasionally when the writer attends a coaching school or reads a book on athletics he finds a coach or author defending some tactic in the realm of questionable sportsmanship. When in doubt about a practice it should be eliminated. If it needs defending in all likelihood it is no good. One thing and one thing only counts, that is justice and right.

Unscrupulous tactics never built a life or won a ball game even though the score favored the one who stooped to these practices. The writer in his twenty-five years of experience has never known a coach who used these methods that was truly respected of men. Furthermore, this unscrupulous person is always defending himself. The coach of lofty principles and ideals doesn't have to do this. After every game he is victorious. He knows he does not live on the scores of the game. They are soon forgotten. He lives with his friends and enjoys them because they know he is above pettiness. No price is too high to pay for this admiration and respect.

Finally, scientific development has brought men close together and provided means for his quick extermination. It is no longer a question of whether we should try to get along. **We must get along or perish.** Someone expressed it editorially in this manner: "The Atomic Bomb Is Here To Stay. Are We?"

Athletic progress can contribute more towards the creation of attitudes whereby men can agree than any other single activity. Boys and girls believe in and idolize coaches. **These athletes will run the world tomorrow.** Their lives will be lived along principles they learned in competitive sports. If they are taught fair

play and play the game fairly and squarely, never stooping to pettiness, they will pursue the same course through life. They will be willing to live and let live in a world where there is no other choice.

It is in international sports that our salvation lies. Every coach has seen boys and girls battle up and down the field or court putting forth all of the energy they could command. When the final gun sounded they have seen opponents leave the scene of battle arm-in-arm without any sign of animosity. When nations meet on athletic fields and struggle for superiority on a high level of sportsmanship they will create friendliness that will destroy any desire to meet on battlefields to slaughter. Scores determined by touchdowns, field goals, or runs are far more desirable than scores of scarlet written with the blood of men, women, and children.

The thought of even one grand fellow who performed nobly on the basketball court or field and died gloriously on the battlefield for a world of decency should erase forever the desire to coach any other way than that based upon the nobility of mankind. The coach must awaken to this great charge that is his. The civilization of the future is his goal, and basketball, baseball, track, or football coached nobly will insure a decent one.

The galaxy of Gold Stars represents a nobility of youth this country can ill afford to lose. But their loss can inspire those who come after them to work for the better world for which they sacrificed all, and with eyes ever cast in the direction they have traveled to strive for the realization of the dream of those who sleep forever.

It is my prayer that the Sportsmanship Committee will not have to meet a single time during the year of 1956-57. This is possible through the full cooperation of every member in the state. I hope that you will have mimeographed a copy of "WHEN WE PLAY" for each of your boys and girls and have them learn it and live it.

From The Secretary's Desk

This section of the Bulletin contains in summary form special information in regards to changes in the regulations of the Georgia High School Association and other details.

CHANGE IN CLASSIFICATIONS—Beginning with the 1956-57 school year there will be five classifications. A school will be in the same classification for all activities. Class AAA, Class AA, and Class A will be set up on a region basis for all purposes of administration and competition. Class B and Class C will be set up on a region basis only for football; for all other purposes of competition and administration Class B and Class C will be on a Congressional district basis. However, beginning with the school year 1957-58, Class B and Class C will be placed on a region basis with probably four regions in Class B and eight regions in Class C. Information will be furnished to the district for their study and reactions. The classification limits for this year will be:

Class AAA	—————	ADA of 650 and above
Class AA	—————	ADA from 400 to 650
Class A	—————	ADA from 300 to 400
Class B	—————	ADA from 200 to 300
Class C	—————	ADA of less than 200

DISTRICT AND REGION EXECUTIVE COMMITTEES—A provision has been made that in any case where a member of the State Executive Committee is not an elected member of his respective District or Region Committee, he shall be an added member of such committee. The purpose of this is to be able to furnish to each district and region a direct connection with the State Executive Committee.

SPORTSMANSHIP COMMITTEE—The size of the Sportsmanship Committee has been expanded to fifteen members of the State Executive Committee in addition to the State President and the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer, with at least four members necessary to act on any case. In the past there has quite often been delay in the action of the Sportsmanship Committee due to the fact that it has not always been possible to assemble the members of the committee on short notice. Increasing the size of the committee will make it possible to secure quicker action on a case as with a reservoir of seventeen from which to draw, the necessary number to act on a case should be obtained quickly.

ELIGIBILITY CHECK-UP—An addition has been made to the eligibility requirements to make it clear that in any district or region event no team is eligible to participate unless a certified copy of the eligibility list for that school from the state office is in the hands of the district or region secretary or chairman prior to the

event, and with the exception provided for the music festivals, no pupil is eligible to participate unless properly listed. Specific coverage is given to make this a responsibility for the district and region in district and region events.

PURCHASE OF PROPERTY—In accordance with the directions of the State Executive Committee the large corner lot adjacent to the present building has been purchased. This gives the Association space for any possible expansion and adequate parking area. Acquisition of this property gives the Association a very desirable piece of property of approximately rectangular shape fronting 125 feet on one street and 112 feet on the other street.

SPECIAL INFORMATION—In the back of this Bulletin is complete information in regards to a number of state events. Information available consists of:

1. One Act Plays and Debates—complete program and schedule
2. State Literary Meet—complete time schedule of events
3. State Track Meet—time and order of events
4. Baseball Eliminations—pairings and full details
5. Basketball Tournament pairings except for Class B and Class C
6. Tennis—schedule information and details

POLICY IN REGARDS TO NON-ATHLETIC CONTESTS and/or ACTIVITIES—for the school year 1956-57 the policy previously set by the State Executive Committee in regards to non-athletic contests and/or activities has been continued. This policy is as follows:

1. Any contest and/or activity beyond state lines—a contest and/or activity of a national or sectional nature—would be approved if it is on the list of contests as approved by the contest committee of the Secondary School Principals Association of the NEA.
2. Any contest and/or activity limited to the State of Georgia may be approved by the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer or referred by him to the State Executive Committee.
3. Any contest and/or activity limited to a County or an Independent School System may be approved by the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer if such contest and/or activity has the endorsement of the respective County or Independent System School Superintendent.

BASEBALL COACHING BOX—Baseball rules provide that by State action the rule barring coaches from the coacher's box may be modified. Beginning with the 1957 baseball season in Georgia one coach who is in uniform may occupy one of the coacher's boxes while his team is at bat. A coach in proper uniform may coach either at first base box or at third base box, but only one box may be occupied by a member of the coaching staff, and such member must be in uniform.

BASKETBALL COURT MARKINGS—Under the basketball rules the use of the wide free throw lane becomes mandatory for the 1957-58 season and may become effective for 1956-57 by State adoption. The State Executive Committee has adopted the wide free throw lane beginning with the 1956-57 school year. Along with this are several other changes in the marking of basketball courts. Explanation of these markings may be found in the Boys Basketball rules on page 2 and page 32. These changes are:

1. Wide free throw lane—12 feet
2. Width of free throw line will be 2 inches instead of 1 inch.
3. The part of the arc within the free throw lane will consist of 8 arcs each approximately 16 inches long, and 7 spaces each approximately 14 inches long.
4. The letters "H" and "V" will be eliminated from along the free throw lane; spaces will still be marked but without the letters.

SANCTION OF BASKETBALL TOURNAMENTS—All requests for sanction of invitational basketball tournaments will be sent direct to the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer. Schools wishing to sponsor an invitational tournament will file request with the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer and not with the district or region. It will not be necessary for a school wishing to participate in a sanctioned tournament to secure clearance from its own respective district or region. The number of invitation tournaments has been increasing and with the overlapping of classification areas, many problems have occurred in trying to clear tournaments with all districts and regions that might have teams wishing to participate in tournaments.

DATES FOR ENDING OF THE FOOTBALL SEASON—Due to the fact that November of 1956 has five Thursdays, the regular football season does not end with the Saturday immediately following Thanksgiving, but with December 1, 1956. This will automatically set the semi-final playoffs for the week end of December 8, 1956 and the finals for the week end of December 15, 1956.

LOCATION OF FOOTBALL PLAYOFF GAMES—In the playoff regions—semi-finals—in the odd calendar year, the odd numbered region will be the home or host team; in the even calendar year, the even numbered region will be the home or host team. The home or host team will designate the site for the semi-final football playoff game. In accordance with the provisions of the regulations for determining the location of the State Final Championship game, Class AAA has by action of its membership, designated the winner of the Southern Division as the home or host team for the final state championship game in its class with the home or host team designating the site of the final game.

EARLIER DATE FOR FOOTBALL PLAYOFF GAME—In any case where two teams have completed their football schedule and are to meet in the playoffs, they may play at an earlier date than the time set for the playoffs by agreement of the two schools concerned and with the approval of the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer.

CHANGE IN TRACK EVENTS—The Half-mile relay has been eliminated from the Track program of events. The 440 Yards Relay and the Mile Relay have been added to the Track program. An individual may take part in both relays and in three other events as a maximum, subject to the restrictions which provide that in the additional events not more than two may be running events, and further that in no case may an individual compete in more than one event in which he runs a distance of 440 yards or greater. This means that in any combination of events which an individual wishes to enter he may not participate in but one of the following: 440 Yards Dash, Half Mile, Mile, Mile Relay.

STATE LITERARY MEET—2 DAYS—Due to the addition of another classification the State Literary Meet (except for One Act Plays and Debates) will be a two-day meet. The Class AA and Class A events will be held on Friday, April 19, 1957, and the Class B and Class C events will be held on Saturday, April 20, 1957.

LITERARY JUDGES—A change has been made in the provision which applies to Region and District Literary events whereby the Region or District may use, one, two, or three judges in an event as the region or district may see fit. This gives the regions and districts an option to set up the number of judges in accordance with the wishes of the schools in the region or district.

DEBATE VISITING—The provision in the Debate section which has barred visiting or listening to other debaters, has been eliminated.

ELECTRIC TYPEWRITERS BARRED—In the typing contests the contestants are responsible for furnishing their own typewriters. Electric typewriters will not be permitted in the contests.

GIRLS DECLAMATION—The contest in Reading for girls has been eliminated and in its place has been substituted a contest in Girls Declamation. The regulations which apply to the Boys Declamation will apply to the contest. There will be separate contests in declamation for girls and for boys.

HOME ECONOMICS—A clarification has been made in this contest to make it clear that the contest is open to boys as well as to girls even though the feminine pronoun is used in the description of the contest.

PIANO LIST—The list of selections for the Piano Solo has been revised. This has been done under the direction of Dr. Arthur L. Rich, Head of the Department of Music, Mercer University, Macon, Georgia, in cooperation with a number of music teachers throughout the state.

MUSIC FESTIVALS—A study of the operation of the Music Festivals was made by a joint committee of the GHSA and the Georgia Music Educators Association. The committee made a series of recommendations which were accepted by the GMEA at its April 1954 convention. These recommendations with several minor changes have been accepted by the State Executive Committee of the GHSA. The following will apply to the school year 1956-57:

1. All High Schools entering the Music Festivals must be members of the Georgia High School Association.
2. Only bona fide pupils may compete.
3. All high school pupils participating must meet the eligibility requirements of the GHSA.
4. Eligibility rules apply only after a pupil has entered the 9th grade.
5. All details of the 1956-57 Music Festivals, such as classifications, fees, selection of judges, etc., will be under the supervision of the GMEA.
6. Dates for the 1956-57 Music Festivals will be set in conjunction with the GHSA so that there will be a minimum of conflicts.
7. A pupil enrolled in the 8th grade or below of a feeder elementary school will be permitted to participate with a high school band and such participation will not be charged against such pupil so as to affect later eligibility.
8. The GMEA will furnish each school competing in the Region Music Festival a copy of the financial report of that festival; a copy of the report of each festival and a composite report of each festival will be furnished the GHSA by the GMEA.

Item 7 above in regards to the Music Festivals makes it possible for pupils enrolled in 8th grade or below of feeder elementary schools to participate with the high school band. It was the feeling of the State Executive Committee that there were a number of high schools in which the music program was extended into the 8th grade or lower in order to build up a band. It was the further feeling of the State Executive Committee that such pupils in feeder elementary schools should be permitted to participate as a part of the high school band without such participation being charged against the pupil so as to affect the pupil's future eligibility.

The GMEA has requested dates for the 1957 festivals which correspond with the dates used for 1956 except for the date for the Region 4 festivals. These dates have been approved for 1957 festivals:

- Region 1 Feb. 21, 22, 23, 1957 (Place to be set)
- Region 2 March 4, 5, 1957 at Columbus
- Region 3 February 27, 28, March 1, at Carrollton
- Region 4 February 7, 8, 1957 at Athens
- Region 5 February 28, March 1, 1957 at Collegeboro.

PRINCIPAL'S RESPONSIBILITY—One of the biggest jobs that the High School Principal has is to see that the activities and athletic programs function in accordance with school policy and Georgia High School Association regulations. Most problems arise because of lack of knowledge. The high school principal has a vast amount of duties and it is easy to overlook certain duties. A principal who overlooks some of his duties sooner or later will find himself involved in problems, and responsibility for the solution on his shoulders. Given below are some suggestions as to what can be done by the busy principal to see that the program functions in accordance with school policy and the GHSA regulations:

1. The Principal must have a thorough knowledge of the Constitution and By-Laws and the rules and regulations of the Georgia High School Association. He cannot depend on one of his staff members to know them for him.
2. The principal must have an athletic and activities staff organization which can be directed easily and carry out the policy of the administration.
3. He must have an in-service training program for the athletic and activities staff that will assure him that all faculty managers, athletic directors, and activities directors know the rules. Quite often excuses are given for violations that "We did not know." Such excuses would not be accepted in other fields. Several times this past year schools

were barred from contests due to failure to file notice of entry on time.

4. Principals must supervise the organization he establishes. The football field, the gymnasium, the band room, the dressing rooms, equipment storage, etc., should be on his visitation schedule. He cannot leave to chance the physical factors of his plant as these contribute materially to the health and welfare of the pupils. He should be aware of the entire operational program—he cannot leave to chance the physical condition and examination of his players.
5. He should attend all meetings of his district and/or region. It is in these meetings that policies of statewide organization are established. Here is an opportunity to help. A voter who does not exercise his right of franchise should not complain about action taken. Last year meetings were held all over the state for training purposes—some were well attended—some were not.
6. The principal should keep the public informed of the purposes of athletics and activities and the methods used to obtain these objectives. In the public relations job he can avail himself of newspapers and radio. Through such organizations as PTA, civic clubs, service clubs, he can keep the patrons of his school sympathetic with the activity and athletic program. Quite often the importance of keeping the public informed of the GHSA purposes and regulations is overlooked.
7. The principal should be sure that he knows the contents of any report to be signed and sent to the state office. Quite frequently is heard the statement "The coach made out the report, all I did was to sign it" or "the pupil filled out the individual sheet, all I did was to sign it." If a check has a signature and the person signing it has funds in the bank, such checks will be honored if the signer signed in blank and "didn't know the amount."

Constitution

ARTICLE I—Name of the Organization

This organization shall be known as the Georgia High School Association.

ARTICLE II—Object of the Organization

The object of this organization shall be the promotion of education in Georgia from a mental, physical, and moral viewpoint; to promote the study of public speaking, to standardize and encourage athletics, and to promote appreciation for music, homemaking and other cultural arts through District, Region and State Contests.

ARTICLE III—Membership

Sec. 1. Schools Eligible for Membership—The Membership of the Georgia High School Association shall consist only of white senior high schools.

Sec. 2. Grouping of Membership By Size—The Membership of the Association shall be divided into five groups as follows:

Class AAA. Composed of eligible high schools with an adjusted A. D. A. of 650 or more.

Class AA. Composed of eligible high schools with an adjusted A. D. A. from 400 to 650.

Class A. Composed of eligible high schools with an adjusted A. D. A. from 300 to 400.

Class B. Composed of eligible high schools with an adjusted A. D. A. from 200 to 300.

Class C. Composed of eligible high schools with an adjusted A. D. A. of less than 200.

These membership classifications shall apply for purposes of administration and competition.

Class AAA, Class AA, and Class A schools will be grouped by regions for all competitions.

Class B and Class C schools will be grouped by Congressional Districts for all competition except football. Football for Class B and Class C schools will be by regions. (Note: Beginning with the school year 1957-58 Class B and Class C schools will be grouped in regions for all competition.)

Sec. 3. GROUPING—HOW DETERMINED—The classification of schools into various groups shall be based on the Average Daily Attendance (A. D. A.) secured from the State Department of

Education of July 1st annual report. The A. D. A. report at the classification period shall be used as a basis to determine the classification of a school for a two-year period. In case of a consolidation at a classification period the A. D. A. of the schools consolidated shall be combined to determine the classification. The adjusted A.D.A. shall be calculated as follows:

- a. The four-year high school shall be used as a base and for a three-year high school $\frac{1}{3}$ shall be added to the A. D. A. to determine classification figure.
- b. The double sex school (co-ed) shall be used as a base, and for a single sex school the A. D. A. shall be doubled to determine classification figure.

(Note: Classification for the school years 1956-57 and 1957-58 is based on the A. D. A. reports for the school year 1954-55. The next reclassification will be based on the reports for the school year 1956-57 and will become effective in the school year 1958-59.)

Sec. 4. GROUPING OF MEMBERSHIP BY DISTRICTS AND REGIONS — All Class AAA (District-at-Large) and all Class AA and A schools shall be members of the Region organization in which they are located. All Class B and Class C schools shall be members of the District organization in the Congressional District in which they are located.

Sec. 5. COLLEGES—Junior Colleges and preparatory departments of colleges are ineligible for membership in this Association.

Sec. 6. JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOLS—Junior High Schools are ineligible for membership in this Association.

Sec. 7. TRANSFERS FROM A DISTRICT — Any eligible school which is located near the border of a district and because of its location wishes to be transferred to membership in a neighboring district, may do so on consent of the District Committee from both districts and the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer, provided no rules are violated otherwise, and provided that request for transfer of membership is made to the State Office within 30 days after notice of reclassification has been made.

Sec. 8. TRANSFER TO A HIGHER CLASSIFICATION—Any eligible school on application to the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer may be permitted to move from a lower to a higher classification but a school will not be permitted to change from the classification as set by its classification figures to a lower classification. Any school which moves from a lower to a higher classification by application must remain in the higher classification until schools are reclassified on a state wide basis. Requests for

transfer to a higher classification must be made to the State Office within 30 days after notice of reclassification has been made. A school which transfers to a higher classification transfers to that classification for all administration and competition.

Sec. 9. MEMBERSHIP IN ANOTHER ASSOCIATION — A school is ineligible for membership in the Georgia High School Association if it is or becomes a member of any association whose Constitution and/or By-Laws conflict with those of the Georgia High School Association.

ARTICLE IV—How Governed

Sec. 1. STATE OFFICERS—The state Officers of this Association shall consist of a President, a Vice-President, and an Executive Secretary-Treasurer. The officers and the Director of State School Supervision shall be ex-officio members to the State Executive Committee and shall have the right to vote on all matters pertaining to the operation of the Association. These with the members elected from the Congressional Districts by the Class B and Class C schools and with the members elected from the Regions by the Class AAA, Class AA, and the Class A schools shall constitute the State Executive Committee.

Sec. 2. BOARD OF TRUSTEES—Said Georgia High School Association shall have a Board of Trustees (three in number) consisting of the three persons holding the following State offices of said Association to wit: President, Vice-President, and Executive Secretary-Treasurer, and their respective successors in office. Said Board of Trustees shall receive and hold title to all real and personal property of said Association, in trust for the benefit of said Association and shall have general custody and administration of such property with power and authority to lease, sell and convey said property of said Association; provided, however, said Board of Trustees shall not sell or convey any real property so held by them in trust for said Association without first being authorized to do so by a majority vote of the State Executive Committee of said Association at a meeting duly called for such purpose.

Sec. 3. STATE APPEAL BOARD—The State Appeal Board shall be composed of five members elected by the State Executive Committee. The members of this Board shall be selected from the various classifications of schools with each classification being represented. The term of each member of the State Appeal Board shall be for three years and terms shall be so staggered that not more than two members' terms will expire in the same year.

Sec. 4. DISTRICT AND REGION OFFICERS.

(a) Each Congressional District shall elect a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary-Treasurer, and three other committee-

men who shall be from Class B and Class C in proportion to the number of member schools from each class. No two shall be from the same school, and any person so elected shall be connected with a member school in an administrative or instructional capacity. These officers together with any members of the State Executive Committee from the District shall compose the Executive Committee in their district.

(b) Each Class AA and Class A Region shall elect a President, a Secretary-Treasurer, and from one to three other committeemen. No two shall be from the same school, and any person, so elected shall be connected with a member school in an administrative or instructional capacity. These officers together with any member of the State Executive Committee from the Region shall compose the Executive Committee in their region.

(c) Class AAA (District-at-Large) shall elect a President and a Vice-President. These together with the Chairman elected by each region and the members of the State Executive Committee from Class AAA shall compose the Executive Committee for Class AAA. No two shall be from the same school and any person so elected shall be connected with a member school in an administrative or instructional capacity. This committee may designate one member from their committee to act as recording secretary and treasurer. The State Executive Secretary-Treasurer shall act as Secretary for Class AAA.

(d) Any member of the State Executive Committee who is not an elected member of his District or Region Executive Committee, shall be an added member of his respective District or Region Executive Committee. The provision that only one member of the District or Region Executive Committee may come from the same school will apply only to the members elected by the District or Region, and in any case where the State Executive Committee member in a District or Region is from the same school as an elected member, such shall not bar either from serving.

Sec. 5. DUTIES OF OFFICERS—The duties of the various officers and committees shall be those usually devolving upon such officers and committees. It is specifically the duty of the State Executive Committee, the District Executive Committee, and the Region Executive Committee to seek at all times to educate the school officials under their jurisdiction concerning the Constitution and By-Laws of this Association and at the same time to check vigorously any practice or violation of the rules by exercising the full penalty for such violations if it seems necessary.

Sec. 6. ELECTION OF OFFICERS

(a) A President and a Vice-President shall be elected as State Association officers at the annual meeting of the Georgia High

School Association each year. Any person so elected shall be connected with a member school in an administrative or instructional capacity. In any case where a new president is elected, the retiring president, if eligible to serve, shall be elected Vice-President. The election and term of office of the Executive Secretary-Treasurer shall be for a term of one to five years in the discretion of the State Executive Committee, and the President and the Vice-President shall be authorized to execute a contract in the name of and for the Georgia High School Association. Only members of the State Executive Committee shall be entitled to vote in elections. Should the President at any time become disqualified by death, resignation, or otherwise, the Vice-President shall assume the office immediately and shall act as President until the next annual election.

(b) A President, a Vice-President, a Secretary-Treasurer and three district committeemen shall be elected as officers for each district at any Spring meeting. Term of office shall be for one year. Each member school shall have only one vote.

(c) A President, a Secretary-Treasurer and from one to three region committeemen shall be elected as officers for each Class AA and Class A region at any Spring meeting. Term of office shall be for two years. The even numbered regions shall elect in the even numbered calendar years, and the odd numbered regions shall elect in the odd numbered calendar years.

(d) A President and a Vice-President shall be elected as officers for Class AAA (District-at-Large) at the annual Spring meeting each year. Each region of Class AAA (District-at-Large) shall elect a Region Chairman at any Spring meeting. Term of office of Region Chairman shall be two years, with the even numbered regions electing in the even numbered calendar years and the odd numbered regions electing in the odd numbered calendar years.

(e) State Executive Committee from each district and region shall be elected for terms of three years at any Spring meeting where there is a vacancy to be filled. Terms of the members of the State Executive Committee shall be so arranged or staggered that the terms of approximately one-third of the total number of members shall expire each year. Each Congressional District shall elect one member from each class of school represented in the Congressional District. Each Region in Class AA and Class A shall elect one member. Class AAA shall elect one member from each region in Class AAA with such election being made at the Spring meeting of the Class AAA (District-at-Large). In any region or district meeting each member school shall have one vote.

(NOTE: This section does not make the District President, Region President, or Region Chairman the automatic representative to the

State Executive Committee, neither does it bar the election of any district or region officers to membership on the State Executive Committee.)

(f) Vacancies occurring on a District or Region Committee shall be filled by the Committee until the next meeting of the District or Region. Vacancies occurring on the State Executive Committee shall be filled by the District or Region Committee until the next meeting of the District or Region concerned.

Sec. 7. AUTHORITY.

(a) The State Executive Secretary-Treasurer shall be authorized to interpret rules with authority to impose the proper penalty.

(b) All questions of eligibility, or of any other matter subject to investigation, must first be submitted to the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer, who shall make a ruling thereon after hearing and/or examining the evidence of both sides and/or other party or parties concerned with authority to impose the proper penalty. If either the defendant or the plaintiff is not satisfied with the decision, appeal may then be made to the State Appeal Board through the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer. In the event that State Executive Secretary-Treasurer fails to act within one week, an appeal may then be made direct to the State Appeal Board either through the State President or the State Secretary-Treasurer. After hearing and/or examining the evidence submitted by both sides and/or other party or parties concerned the State Appeal Board shall render a decision in the matter. If either party is still dissatisfied with the decision or if the State Appeal Board fails to act within one week, either party may appeal to the State Executive Committee through the state Executive Secretary-Treasurer provided the party or parties appealing shall pay the entire expenses of the State Executive Committee when called together for this purpose. The State Executive Committee shall then hear and/or examine the evidence submitted by both sides and/or other parties concerned and render a decision. This last appeal shall be final and anyone seeking redress through any other channel shall forfeit their membership in the Georgia High School Association for a minimum period of one calendar year. No other method of appeal shall be held valid and any appeal must begin with the first step outlined and not eliminate any step until reaching the final court of appeal, the State Executive Committee. In any case where the decision by the State Executive Committee is in favor of the appealing party or parties the State Executive Committee may charge the expense of the meeting to the Georgia High School Association and reimburse the appealing party or parties.

Sec. 8. VOTE—Each school shall have one vote in a District or Region meeting and each member of the State Executive Com-

mittee shall have one vote in a State Executive Committee meeting. In any case where a member of the State Executive Committee is unable to attend a State Executive Committee meeting, the District President for Class B or Class C, the Region President for Class AA and Class A, or the Region Chairman for Class AAA shall have the power to appoint some schoolman from the membership of the district or region to represent the district or region at this particular meeting.

Sec. 9. AMEND CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS—It shall take a two-thirds vote of the State Executive Committee to amend the Constitution. A majority of votes shall be required to amend the By-Laws. Changes shall not go into effect until the beginning of the next school year. Any proposed changes in the Constitution must be submitted to the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer in writing by March 1. These proposed changes shall be submitted by the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer to each Region Chairman in Class AAA, each Region Secretary in Class AA and Class A, and each District Secretary in Class B and Class C, not later than April 1.

Sec. 10. ANNUAL MEETING—The State Executive Committee of the Georgia High School Association shall meet in executive session in May or June of each year on such date as may be designated by the State Executive Committee. The State Officers in conference shall set the time and place of this annual meeting. In addition to the annual meeting the State President shall call a meeting in November, December, or January for the purpose of studying proposed legislation so that such proposals can be passed on to the various districts and regions for their opinions prior to the annual meeting, and for the purpose of considering any other matters that may be brought before the State Executive Committee. In addition to these meetings, special meetings may be called by the State President at any time or place provided that written notice is given to all members of the committee at least twenty-four hours prior to the time of the meeting.

Sec. 11. SUSPENSION OF A SCHOOL—The State Executive Committee and/or the District Executive Committee and/or the Region Executive Committee and/or the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer have authority to forfeit any games or events won by a school under its jurisdiction and/or to suspend from membership in the Association any school under its jurisdiction on sufficient evidence of the violation of the rules of the Association, with the provision that appeal may be made in the manner presented in Article IV, Section 7. Suspension of membership may be made to a maximum of twelve months.

ARTICLE V—General Provisions**Sec. 1. REPORTS.**

(a) The Superintendent or Principal of each member school shall make reports to District, Region, and State Secretaries at the time prescribed in the By-Laws and in the manner called for, and also such other reports as may be requested by District Committee, Region Committee, State Executive Committee or State Executive Secretary-Treasurer.

(b) The Secretary of each District or Region, or his representative shall make a written report of the financial condition of his district or region organization and on all activities in his district or region, naming champions in basketball and track, if any be declared by district or region and all other district or region activities to the State Executive Committee at the annual meeting.

(c) All reports of a District Secretary, Region Secretary or Region Chairman concerning entries in the State Basketball tournaments and the State Meet or concerning any routine matter pertaining to the Georgia High School Association shall be addressed to the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer. These reports shall be filed in the State Office for future reference.

Sec. 2. CONTESTS—Each district or region may hold annual contests in declamation, music, debate, spelling, essay, home economics, athletics, typing, shorthand, agriculture, and other forms of contests which may be authorized by the State Executive Committee calculated to promote the cause of education on dates to be announced in this Bulletin under the rules governing the State and District or Regional Meets. Schools will compete in their own classification in State, District, and Regional meets. Winners in these District and Regional meets may be sent to the State Meet in both athletic and literary events.

Sec. 3. TREASURER—The Treasurer of each district and region is required to make an itemized statement of the income and outgo of all funds to the District or Region Executive Committee. The State Executive Secretary-Treasurer is required to make a similar statement to the State Executive Committee. When a new Treasurer is elected, any balance must be turned over to the new officer immediately.

Sec. 4. OFFICE—The permanent office of the Georgia High School Association shall be the office of the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer. From this office shall be sent out bulletins and all other routine blanks and forms. Requests for such material shall be addressed to the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer. The person in charge of the State Office shall have charge of making all arrangements for holding and conducting the State Meets and Tournaments.

By-Laws

Sec. 1. A student is eligible to represent his or her school of all classifications, unless otherwise noted, in interscholastic contests:

- Item (1) Who is a regular student taking four units of work.
- Item (2) Who meets the requirement of the normal semesters or years of enrollment. (See Section 6, Item 10 of Definitions.)
- Item (3) Who is not a special student.
- Item (4) Who has passed in three unit subjects or their equivalent the previous semester. (Previous semester means the semester immediately preceding participation.)
- Item (5) Who has been in attendance within 25 calendar days of the beginning of the respective semester.
- Item (6) Who is an amateur.
- Item (7) Who is not playing on a school team and some other team during the same period of time. Period of time means from the time a pupil reports out for the school team until the end of the season in that sport. (This means that a pupil is free to play with an independent team so long as the pupil has not reported out for the school team, but when a pupil reports out for the school team, the pupil cannot play from then on to the end of the sports season with any one except the school team.)
- Item (8) Whose department satisfies the requirements of the school authorities.
- Item (9) Who is not a four-year or a senior high school graduate. (Note. A pupil who has met the graduation requirements of his high school and who is qualified for graduation is considered a graduate.)
- Item (10) Who has not played four years of high school competition in that sport or event.
- Item (11) Who has not attained his or her 19th birthday prior to May 1st.
- Item (12) Who is not a migrant pupil of less than a year's standing.
- Item (13) Who has not participated in any unauthorized game or contest.
- Item (14) Who has not signed any professional athletic contract.
- Item (15) Who has not received any expenses to nor participated in any professional tryout.
- Item (16) Who is listed on a properly certified eligibility list.

Sec. 2. A school to be eligible to participate in interscholastic contests in this Association:

- Item (1) Shall be a member of the Georgia High School Association.
- Item (2) Shall be a white senior high school.
- Item (3) Must pay annual dues to the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer. It is the responsibility of the individual school to see that dues reach the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer. Dues paid on or before October 15 will be 20c per pupil A. D. A. as based on the report made to the State Department of Education for the previous year, with the minimum dues for any school being \$15.00. Dues paid after Oct. 15 will be 22c per pupil A. D. A. as based on the report made to the State Department of Education for the previous year, with minimum dues for any school being \$16.50. After October 1st, no school is eligible to participate in any contest until its membership dues for the current year are paid.
- Item (4) Shall be governed by person or persons who believe in fairness and honesty, an evidence of which shall be the strict observance of all rules and regulations in regards to eligibility of contestants representing their school.
- Item (5) Must not have been disqualified as a member school for violation of the Constitution or By-Laws within one year.
- Item (6) Must operate all inter-school contests and activities under direct and complete control of the school administration or designated school personnel. Responsibilities related to such things are not to be delegated by the board of education, superintendent, or principal, to any person or persons, other than regular members of the school staff. This control shall include the handling of all finance, including capital outlay; the purchase of equipment and supplies; and the employment and payment of salaries to all personnel connected with the activity.
- Item (7) Shall employ no athletic coach, nor use anyone on its athletic coaching staff who is not a full-time teacher, certified by the State Department of Education, and receives his or her entire pay from the Board of Education that employs him or her. (A coach not employed by the Board of Education but who lives in the community and earns his living in some other manner but gives his time to the school is strictly in violation of this rule.)
- Item (8) Must abide by all rules of the State organization and also the District and Region organization when the rules of

the District or Region organization are not in conflict with the rules of the State organization.

Item (9) Shall not play an independent team or a team of some other school not a member of this or some allied organization. Exceptions:

1. Member schools may schedule and play junior high schools.
2. Member schools may schedule and play amateur baseball teams provided that there is no objection on the part of the school authorities where the independent team is located and that in no case will an independent team use any boy enrolled in a high school if there is objection by local school authorities.
3. Member schools may participate in interscholastic contests with member schools of a private non-state association provided that all transfer pupils of the member school of the private school association be eligible only after a full year's attendance at the private school concerned.
4. Member schools may schedule and may play a college freshman team, a college "B" team, or a Junior College team in any sport.

Item (10) Must make out complete eligibility papers which shall consist of **ORIGINAL** and **TWO CARBON COPIES** of the Eligibility Certificate (Form E-2) and an Individual Sheet (Form E-1) for each player on the eligibility certificate for whom no individual sheet has previously been filed, and forward to the **STATE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY-TREASURER** at least **TEN DAYS** before the first game or contest. The Executive Secretary-Treasurer will return to the school one of the carbons certified under seal of the Georgia High School Association.

The original report for any athletic sport shall show the first game or contest in that sport, giving the date, place, and opponent. Each game played prior to the proper filing of the eligibility report shall be forfeited and in addition thereto, a fine of \$10.00 shall be levied against the school for delayed eligibility list; payments of fine or fines for any delayed eligibility report shall be made to the Executive Secretary-Treasurer. Failure to pay such fine shall prohibit the school from entering any contest. Deadline for payment of fine shall be ten days from notification date. The Executive Secretary-Treasurer is authorized and directed to suspend from member-

ship any school which fails to file eligibility report. The Executive Secretary-Treasurer is authorized and directed to reject any eligibility report not submitted with **ORIGINAL** and **TWO CARBONS** and without the necessary individual sheets and to return same to the school concerned.

Any supplementary eligibility reports for basketball and/or additions to basketball eligibility reports made after February 10th must be accompanied by a delayed fee of \$5.00 per list. This will not apply in a case where a pupil has transferred from one school to another within ten days prior to February 10th or after February 10th and in a case where the first semester ends after February 10th. In any case where the first semester ends after February 10th, additions must be made within ten days of the end of the semester to avoid delay fee.

Eligibility reports are required for all literary contestants just as for athletic contestants. Eligibility reports for Debates and One Act Plays are due not later than December 15. Any eligibility report for Debate and/or One Act Play filed after December 15 must be accompanied by a delayed fee of \$10.00 per report.

No school is eligible to participate in any district or region event until a certified copy of the eligibility report for that school from the State Office is in the hands of the district or region secretary or chairman prior to the event.

- (Item 11) Shall allow only one football game per week by the same team on the season average. (Maximum number of games for the regular season is ten.)
- Item (12) Shall allow no baseball team to play more than twenty baseball games during the season. (This does not include District and Regional Tournaments and State Elimination Series.)
- Item (13) Shall allow no basketball team to play more than thirty basketball games during the season. (This does not include District, Regional, and State Tournaments.)
- Item (14) Shall allow its basketball team to enter only one tournament in addition to the District or Regional Tournament. (The State Tournament is considered to be a continuation of the District or Regional Tournament in which a team participates.)
- Item (15) Shall allow no student to switch from one team to an-

- other so as to engage in more than one football game per week.
- Item (16) Shall provide strict physical examination by a competent physician of each and every contestant at the beginning of each season in each sport.
- Item (17) Must fill out blanks prepared by the State Office for District or Region Meet at least one week before the event and forward same to District or Region Secretary.
- Item (18) Shall not enter any basketball tournament other than District, Region or State elimination series unless such tournament has been approved by the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer. Participation in any approved basketball tournament other than District, Region, or State elimination series shall count as two games.
- Item (19) Shall not allow its football team to engage in any inter-school practice and/or scrimmage in football.
- Item (20) Shall not cancel any game contract that has been properly executed without the agreement and consent of the other school concerned. Any school failing to carry out a game contract shall be suspended for one full calendar year. (This means that if a cancellation should be made on the last game of a football schedule, that the suspension would continue up to and include the corresponding date of the next calendar year.)
- Item (21) Shall not compete in any interstate tournament or meet in which three or more schools participate, nor in any interstate contest between two schools which involves a round trip exceeding 600 miles, unless such event has been sanctioned by all interested state associations through the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations.
- Item (22) Shall not permit any of its teams or players to participate in any post-season game or contest or in any so called "Bowl or All-Star" game or contest, except where specific authorization has been given by the State Executive Committee..
- Item (23) Shall not permit any of its students to represent the school in any interscholastic activity unless such participants meet the eligibility requirements of the Georgia High School Association. (Exception—Music Festivals.)
- Item (24) Shall not permit any of its students to represent the school in any interscholastic contests and/or activities

unless such activity and/or contest has been approved by the Georgia High School Association.

- Item (25) Shall not through any member of its staff participate in the selection of any all-state, all-region, all-district or all-tournament teams.

Sec. 3. Each District and Region organization through its Executive Committee or proper official or in general session:

- Item (1) May pay its Secretary-Treasurer a salary of \$50.00 or more a year.

- Item (2) Shall collect and pay 5 per cent of the gross receipts of all basketball tournaments held within the District or Region to the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer within five days after the close of the tournament, these funds to be used to defray the expense of the State Association. (Exception. Any basketball tournament confined strictly to schools in the same county and held after the District and Region tournaments have been completed shall not be liable for 5 per cent of the gross receipts.)

- Item (3) Shall collect and pay 10 per cent of the gross receipts of all play-off and post-season football games held within the area to the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer within five days after such game is played. Such payment shall be accompanied by a complete financial report of the game. The school or organization sponsoring such games shall be responsible for the payment and report. It is the responsibility of each school participating in such game to make it clear to the sponsoring agency that payment is a part of the condition under which the game is played, and that in the event that the sponsoring agency does not make payment each school participating in such game will be equally liable for one-half of the payment.

(NOTE: In any contest or tournament in which the State Association receives a percentage of the gross receipts, gross receipts shall be the total remaining after State Sales Tax and Federal Excise Tax has been deducted. Local service charges, stadium charges, etc., are not deductible prior to the calculation of percentage of gate receipts).

- Item (4) Shall provide suitable medals and trophies for individual winners and trophies or banners for winning schools in District and Region competition.
- Item (5) May assess sufficient fee for District and Region Meet entrants to pay expenses of judges, printing, etc., and expenses of representatives to the State Meet.

- Item (6) Shall play girls' basketball under the rules approved by the State Executive Committee.
- Item (7) Shall allow no school to participate in any district or region event unless a certified copy of the eligibility report for that school from the State Office is in the hands of the district or region secretary or chairman prior to the event. Only contestants listed on properly certified eligibility lists are eligible to compete in any district or region event. (Exception—Music Festivals.)
- Item (8) Shall make such rules as may be necessary to successfully operate the District or Region organization, provided the rules are not in conflict with the rules of the State organization. Each district and/or region has the authority to set the deadline dates for notification by schools in that district and/or region of their intention to enter basketball tournaments, track meets, baseball eliminations, tennis eliminations, and any other district and/or region event in which a deadline date is not set on a statewide level.
- Item (9) Shall determine the place or places for the District or Region Meet and basketball tournaments, provide for admission fees, division of funds, and other details necessary for the successful operation of the Meet and tournaments.
- Item (10) Shall through its Secretary (Region Chairman for Class AAA) certify as to the winners in the District or Region basketball tournament, and as to the winners in all events of the District or Region Meet to the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer within such time limits as provided in the By-Laws relative to these events.
- Item (11) May authorize F. F. A. basketball tournaments under the following conditions:
- a. Schools having an agricultural department are permitted to have F. F. A. basketball teams and to hold tournaments provided the rules and regulations concerning the eligibility of students and the conducting of tournaments as outlined in the By-Laws of the Georgia High School Association are observed. Application for sanction of any F. F. A. basketball tournament should be made to the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer.
 - b. Schools that are not members of the Georgia High School Association, but that have an agricultural de-

partment may be permitted to participate in games or tournaments conducted for or by F. F. A. basketball teams, provided the principal or superintendent of the non-member school shall apply to the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer for permission to play and agrees to abide by the rules and regulations concerning eligibility of students as outlined in the By-Laws of the Georgia High School Association.

- Item (12) Shall furnish a copy of complete results of all district or region contests held in and for the district or region to each participating school.

Sec. 4. The State organization through its Executive Committee or proper official:

- Item (1) Shall pay its Executive Secretary-Treasurer according to the contract executed by its authorized representatives.
- Item (2) Shall provide an adequate place for the State Basketball Tournaments and State Meets.
- Item (3) Must provide an official receipt for all dues and fees received from any source, and shall provide for annual audit of the State Association finances by a firm of auditors or a certified public accountant.
- Item (4) Shall pay the State organization officials sixteen cents per mile, one way, as traveling expenses when on official business.
- Item (5) Shall determine if any State Tournament shall be allowed, *and shall allow no tournament in which member schools participate to be held other than district and region eliminations, except by the approval of the Executive Secretary-Treasurer and on the assurance that the tournament will be conducted according to the regulations of the Association. Penalty for the violation of this section is found in Article IV, Section 11 of the Constitution and Section 6, Item 4, of the By-Laws.*
- Item (6) Shall provide eligibilty blanks to each and every member school in sufficient quantities to supply their needs for the year. These blanks shall have space to include name, exact date of birth, grade and other additional information for each individual reported on the eligibility report.

- Item (7) Shall pay to each District and Region Secretary-Treasurer \$5.00 per member school and for the respective district or region. (Exception: Class AAA—District-at-large)
- Item (8) Shall determine what approved interscholastic contests and/or activities may be held among member schools. All contests and/or activities are forbidden to member schools where such schools enter into contests and/or activities for prizes, awards, ratings, etc., unless the sponsor of such contest and/or activity shall first secure approval to hold such contest and/or activity. Member schools who enter such unapproved contests and/or activities are to be penalized the same as for any other breach of eligibility rules of the Association.

Sec. 5. Any private or boarding school may be classified as an associate member with dues based on 50 per cent of its A. D. A. The Georgia Industrial School is classified as an associate member with dues based on 50% of its A. D. A. An associate member will not be eligible to compete for any championship.

Any member school of the Association may schedule and may play an associate member in any activity with the member school playing under high school eligibility rules and the associate member using any of its pupils to which the member school might agree, provided that such agreement be made in writing not less than ten days prior to the game or contest.

Any associate members who are members of the Mid-South Association will be permitted to enter any tournament or meet conducted by that Association in accordance with its rules and regulations when that tournament or meet is confined to member schools of the Mid-South Association.

Sec. 6. DEFINITIONS.

- Item (1) AN AMATEUR is defined as one who has never violated his or her amateur standing by receiving money, tuition, board or pay of any description as compensation for playing on a professional athletic team or in a professional exhibition, or playing under an assumed name. This rule does not prevent a pupil from playing on a semi-pro ball team during the summer vacation or from participating in summer camp work. (Note: To violate any of the above will be interpreted as subsidization).
- Item (2) A UNIT OF WORK is a course of study for which one Carnegie unit will be allowed if completed. (Subtraction and/or cancellation of units already earned shall not be retroactive.)

Item (3) INTERSCHOLASTIC COMPETITION IN THIS ASSOCIATION is interpreted to mean engaging in contests with member schools, associate member schools, or other teams as provided in Section 2, Item 9. Contests with non-member schools or with teams other than those specified in Section 2, Item 9 are not permitted.

Item (4) MIGRATORY RULE—Any pupil who changes schools after enrolling in 9th grade is a migrant. A migrant must remain in the school to which he or she has transferred one full calendar year before he or she may become eligible.

A pupil who transfers from one school to another because his parents transfer or move their residence is eligible in the high school of his parents' residence provided he meets all other requirements.

Promotion from the 9th grade of a Junior High School to a Senior High School in the same service area shall not be considered a change of schools provided the pupil has completed all of the grades offered in the school from which the pupil has transferred.

Item (5) REGISTRATION means the enrolling of a student in any manner.

Item (6) A SPECIAL STUDENT is a person taking work in a school which does not carry credit in terms of Carnegie units; or one who is repeating work already passed; or, a person who is allowed special privileges and is not required to fulfill all duties that pertain to a regular or normal student.

Item (7) A SCHOOL'S SERVICE AREA is defined as one from which a school normally draws its pupils. Whenever claim is made for eligibility of a pupil on the basis of transfer into a school's service area, it must be apparent that the parents of the pupil **have moved from the area** usually served by the school which he left and into the second school's service area.

Item (8) A YEAR'S PLAY constitutes the entering of competitive play in a sport by a student in any manner, either as a substitute for just one play or more; or the playing of the entire season as a regular player on the team.

Item (9) POST-SEASON GAME—Any game played after the conclusion of the regular schedule shall be a postseason game.

- Item (10) The NORMAL SEMESTERS OR YEARS OF ENROLLMENT of a pupil in the last four grades of high school is 8 consecutive semesters or 4 consecutive years. A pupil is ineligible for further participation in interscholastic contests 8 consecutive semesters or 4 consecutive years from date of first entrance or enrollment into grade 9.
- Item (11) GROSS RECEIPTS—In any contest or tournament in which the State Association receives a percentage of the gross receipts, gross receipts shall be the total remaining after State Sales Tax and Federal Excise Tax has been deducted. Local service charges, stadium charges, etc., are not deductible prior to the calculation of percentage of gate receipts.

Sec. 7. SPECIAL REGULATIONS.

- Item (1) POST-SEASON, BOWL, AND ALL-STAR GAMES.

No member school nor any of its pupils shall participate in any post-season, "bowl," or "all-star" game and/or contest except with approval of the State Executive Committee in writing at least ten days prior to the playing of such game or contest.

All so-called "All-Star" and/or "Bowl" games are prohibited except where specific approval of the State Executive Committee is given when such contest is for the benefit of a worthy charity or for educational purposes within the High School Association. It shall be the duty of the State Executive Committee to approve any charitable organization or to designate the educational purpose for any authorized game and/or contest. Participation of any pupil in any unauthorized game and/or contest shall render that pupil ineligible for all further participation.

In any case where an application for sanction of a "post-season" and/or "bowl" football game is approved, only the state championship team in its respective class will be permitted to participate in such a game.

In any game where an application for sanction of a "post-season" and/or "bowl" football game is approved, if any team participating in such game is not from the State of Georgia, clearance for the participation of the non-Georgia team must be made through the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer and in accordance with the regulations of the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations.

- Item (2) SPORTSMANSHIP COMMITTEE**—The State Sportsmanship Committee shall consist of the State President, the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer, and fifteen other members of the State Executive Committee appointed annually by the State President.

Cases of bad sportsmanship shall be reported to the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer who will call a meeting of the Sportsmanship Committee to hear the schools and/or parties involved. Four members of the Sportsmanship Committee will constitute a quorum. For any meeting, the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer will contact sufficient members of the committee to constitute a quorum.

After hearing the reports and evidence of schools and/or parties involved the Sportsmanship Committee shall have the power to take such action as it may see fit up to the suspension of the offending school or schools from membership in the Association for one calendar year.

- Item (3) CERTIFICATION OF ATHLETIC OFFICIALS**—A definite plan for the certification of athletic officials shall be set up by the Georgia High School Association. The State Executive Secretary-Treasurer is instructed to continue the development of the plan, and is given full authorization to proceed with the operation of the plan.

- Item (4) VIOLATION OF ELIGIBILITY RULES**—Any school violating an eligibility rule whether it be due to carelessness, willfulness, ignorance or any other cause shall be subject to a fine of not more than fifty dollars (\$50.00) for each offense and/or suspension from the Association for a period up to a full calendar year and/or forfeiture of games and/or contests involved.

A school which after investigation is adjudged guilty of violating the rules of the Association shall pay the costs incident to such investigation; such cost to be in addition to fines or penalties assessed. Failure to pay the cost shall result in suspension or in lengthening the period of suspension.

The Executive Secretary-Treasurer is authorized to make such investigation as may be necessary and to judge whether or not a school has violated an eligibility rule. If a school is adjudged guilty, the Executive Secretary-Treasurer is authorized to direct the penalty or penalties. Any school adjudged guilty may appeal in the manner prescribed in Article IV, Section 7 of the Constitution.

A school adjudged guilty must accept the ruling of the

Executive Secretary-Treasurer and pay any fine imposed or take an appeal within ten days of the ruling.

- Item (5) SCHOOL PASSES—The State Executive Secretary-Treasurer shall issue to each member school a state pass for the Superintendent, Principal, Band Director, and Athletic Coaches of the school as listed on the information sheet sent in by the school. The name of the person to whom the pass is issued shall be written on the pass. The pass will admit the person named and one other to any high school game or contest in the State of Georgia. (NOTE: These school passes are for the use of school personnel only and are void if presented by any person other than the one named on the pass.)
- Item (6) HARDSHIP COMMITTEE—The Hardship Committee shall be appointed by the State President from the membership of the State Executive Committee, one member coming from each class of schools with staggered terms. Except for the eligibility rules in regards to age, normal semesters and four years of play, the Hardship Committee shall have the authority to set aside the effect of any eligibility rule upon an individual student when in its opinion the rule works an undue hardship upon that student, provided such action shall be the result of the following procedure:
1. The Hardship Committee shall meet at the State Office, Thomaston, Georgia, on September 1, September 26, November 15, and January 19, to consider requests to have a rule or rules set aside for the benefit of individual students and shall consider such requests at the four meetings held for that purpose, but not at any other meetings of the committee except that if conditions upon which request is based develop after January 19, the Executive Secretary-Treasurer is authorized to set a date for a special meeting to be held at the State Office to consider such case or cases. The Principals of all member schools who have filed requests to have the effect of rules set aside for individual students shall be notified of the time of the meeting at which such requests will be considered not less than five days before such meeting. (Exception—A school which files a request less than five days prior to date of a set meeting or a special meeting.)
 2. A request will be considered at a meeting only if complete information concerning the case is filed in writing with the Executive Secretary-Treasurer on or before the date of the meeting.

3. The conditions which caused the student to fail to meet the eligibility requirements must have been beyond the control of the school, the pupil, and/or his parents, and such that none of them could have reasonably have been expected to comply with the rule the violation of which is involved. Ignorance of the rule on the part of any or all of them shall not be considered sufficient cause for setting aside its effects.

4. The decision of the Hardship Committee to set aside the effects of the rule in each individual case shall be unanimous to apply, and such decision shall not be considered as setting a precedent for other cases of a somewhat similar nature.

- Item (7) **MAKE UP WORK**—Make up work will be accepted on the same basis as make up work is provided for all other pupils in the school concerned but with the limit of such make up work for the 1st semester ending ten calendar days after the close of the 1st semester, and with the limit for make up work for the 2nd semester ending with the beginning of the next semester.
- Item (8) **OUTSIDE BASKETBALL AFTER END OF SEASON**—A student who has represented his school in a varsity contest in basketball may not participate in any outside basketball competition during a school year after the end of the basketball season. Participation in such outside competition will affect a high school student as follows: (1) If he is enrolled in his seventh or eighth semester in grades nine to twelve, inclusive, he will be ineligible in all sports for the balance of his high school career; (2) If he has been enrolled in the above grades for six or less semesters, he will be ineligible only for the participation in interscholastic basketball during his succeeding school year.
- Item (9) In baseball, one coach who is in uniform, may occupy one of the coacher's boxes while his team is at bat.

Athletics

TRACK AND FIELD EVENTS

Sec. 1. The National Federation Edition of the Track and Field Rules is the official guide for Georgia High Schools with the exceptions as may be found in special regulations listed below.

- Item (1) Each AA, A, B, and C school may have two entries in each event. Each AAA school may have three entries in each event.

- Item (2) A contestant in track may participate in only one event in which he runs a distance of 440 yards or greater. In any combination in which the individual participates he may enter only one of the following: 440 Yards Dash, 880 Yard Run (Half Mile), Mile Run, Mile Relay.

A contestant in track may enter as a maximum both relays and in addition any one of the combinations as listed below subject to the limitation in the previous paragraph:

- a. Three field events.
- b. Two field events and one running event.
- c. One field event and two running events.

- Item (3) There shall be fourteen track and field events as follows: 100 Yards Dash, 220 Yards Dash, 120 Yards High Hurdles (39"), 180 Yards Low Hurdles (30"), 440 Yards Dash, 880 Yards Run, Mile Run, Mile Relay (4 men), 440 Yards Relay (4 men), Shot Put (12 Pounds), High Jump, Broad Jump, Pole Vault, Discus (High School Weight, 3 lbs. 9 ozs.) (Exception: Class AAA—The Javelin Throw.)

- Item (4) The relay team of a school in a track meet may be composed of any eligible pupils from that school, but after the trials in a meet have been run, there may be no change in the contestants on that team for that respective meet.

- Item (5) In the State B and C Track Meet each district may have two entries in each event. In the State AAA, AA and A Track Meet each region may have three entries in each event.

- Item (6) In any case in a district or region meet where there is a tie in any event involving more contestants than the district or region is entitled to enter in the State Meet, the contest among the tied contestants must be continued or reheld until the representatives to the State Meet are determined. In case of a tie in the original contest the points shall be divided equally among the tied contestants.

The continued or reheld contest shall carry no points. In case of a tie in the State Meet, the tie shall stand, and the points will be equally divided among the tied contestants.

- Item (7) Schools which finish 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th in total points in each classification in the State Meet will be awarded trophies. The District or Region which scores the most points in its classification in the State Meet will receive

the High Point District or Region trophy with such trophy going to the high point school in the winning district or region.

- Item (8) In the District or Regional Meets in the Shot Put, Discus Throw, and Broad Jump events, the giving of qualifying and final trials is optional. If the District or Region Executive Committee wishes to do so it may dispense with the qualifying trials and allow each contestant in any of these events only three trials, only the best of the three trials to count.
- Item (9) The order of events for both District, Regional, and State Meets will be the order as set in the Track and Field Guide for that type of meet.
- Item (10) The time schedule for District and Regional Meets shall be given to each school participating in the meet prior to the start of the meet.
- Item (11) The State Meet will be scheduled as a two day meet according to the schedule announced prior to the State meet, with preliminaries scheduled one day and finals the next. If weather conditions cause a change in the schedule, events may be held at night, or if necessary to condense the meet to one day because of weather conditions, events may be run morning, afternoon, or night.
- Item (12) In the State Meet preliminaries may be eliminated and finals held in any of the field events provided that notice is given prior to the beginning of the meet.
- Item (13) Four places shall be counted in District, Regional, and State Meets. First place shall count 5 points; second place, 3; third place, 2; fourth place, 1.

TENNIS

Sec. 2. Tennis is a District, Regional, and State event separate from track and will not count for points in winning the track trophy in District, Region or State Meet. The District and Region winners who will be certified to the State Office will be eligible to participate in the State Tournament. District and Region eliminations will be set by the respective districts and regions.

Tennis requires two players for the doubles and one player for the singles. A boy or a girl may not participate in both singles and doubles. Four boys will constitute a boys team and four girls will constitute a girls team making a total of four per team from each school. There will be no mixed teams. Four certified players will be eligible to play in any elimination or final matches at the discretion of the coach.

GOLF

Sec. 3.

- a. Golf for Class AAA will be conducted on the basis of plans as set by Class AAA.
- b. Golf for Class AA, A, B, and C will be conducted as an event open to any schools of these classifications. Competition will be held in separate classifications and winners will be named in each classification. Contestants in these four classifications will be certified direct to the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer by the local Superintendent or Principal. Notification of entry by schools of these four classifications must be filed with the State Office not later than midnight, April 24, 1957.

CROSS COUNTRY

Sec. 4. Cross Country will be a State event open to schools of all classifications.

- a. Contestants in Cross Country will be certified direct to the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer by the local Superintendent or Principal. Notification of entry in Cross Country must be filed with the State Office or with Mr. Sidney Scarborough, Director of Athletics, City Hall, Atlanta, Georgia, not later than midnight, November 4, 1956.
- b. A minimum number of 5 and a maximum number of 7 shall be the entry from any one school.
- c. The distance of the Cross Country race will be two miles.
- d. The first five finishers on each team will count for the total team score.
- e. The Cross Country race will be held in Atlanta, Georgia, Waterworks Course, November 16, 1956, at 3:30 p. m. The race will be under the direction of Mr. Sidney Scarborough, Director of Athletics, City of Atlanta.

SWIMMING

Sec. 5. Swimming will be a State event open to schools of all classifications. There will be a contest for boys and a contest for girls.

- a. Swimming will be held at Emory University, Emory, Georgia, on March 24, 1957.
- b. Contestants in Swimming will be certified direct to the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer by the local Superintendent or Principal. Notification of entry in Swimming must be filed with the State Office or with Dr. T. E. McDonough, Emory University, Emory, Georgia, not later than midnight, March 9, 1957.

Football

Sec. 6.

Item (1) Schools shall be classified into five groups for football purposes.

The classification of schools will be obtained as follows:

- a. The four-year high school will be used as a base, and for a three-year high school one-third of the A. D. A. will be added to secure the classification figure.
- b. The co-educational school will be used as a base, and for a single sex school the A. D. A. will be doubled to secure the classification.
- c. The classification of a school will be determined by the following scale:

Class AAA	—650 and up
Class AA	—400 to 650
Class A	—300 to 400
Class B	—200 to 300
Class C	—under 200

Item (2) Classification shall be for a period of two years. Classification for the school years 1956-57 and 1957-58 is based on the A. D. A. figures for the school year 1954-55. Re-classification will be based on the A. D. A. figures for 1956-57. Schools will be notified of their classification by December 1, 1957. Any requests to move into a higher classification will have to be filed by **December 31, 1957**. A school on application to the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer may be permitted to move from a lower to a higher classification but a school will not be permitted to change from the classification as set by its classification figure to a lower classification. Any school which moves from a lower to a higher classification by application must remain in the higher classification until schools are reclassified on a state wide basis.

Item (3) The State will be divided into a maximum of four regions in each class. Region lines will not be the same for all classes. A region composed of a large number of schools may be divided into sub-regions.

Item (4) Whether a region is to be sub-divided or not is a matter to be determined by the region concerned. In any case where a region is sub-divided the number of schools in one of the sub-regions may not be more than 2 greater than the number of schools in the other sub-region.

Item (5) The Region Committee for each classification shall be composed of one member of each school in said region.

- Item (6) The Region Committee shall determine the champion of each region. Each region will determine its own champion in its class, and this champion will have to be determined by the Saturday following Thanksgiving Day. (4th Thursday.) (Exception: for 1956, due to fact that there are five Thursdays in November, the deadline for determining region championships will be December 1, 1956.)
- Item (7) The Championship in each region in its classification will be determined by the region committee on the following basis:
- By percentage standing, counting the regional or designated games, and in case of a tie between two teams, a playoff shall be held.
 - In case of a tie among more than two teams, the percentage standing counting all games with schools of the same classification shall be used to determine the regional winner.
 - If after the application of the above paragraph two or more teams remained tied, a playoff shall be held.
- (NOTE: In calculating the percentage standing the games won shall be divided by the games played with any tie game counting as one-half game won.)
- Item (8) To qualify for championship of a region or sub-region a team must play a minimum number of games with teams in its region and classification as follows:
- In any region or sub-region in which there are 8 or less schools, each school must play each other school in that region or sub-region to qualify for championship consideration.
 - In any region or sub-region in which there are 9 or more schools each school must play 8 regional or sub-regional games to qualify for championship consideration.
 - In any case where a school does not play a regional or sub-regional schedule to qualify for championship consideration, any games played by that school will not count for or against any opponent.
 - Upon presentation to the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer of evidence to show that a school cannot secure the required number of games in a region or sub-region, the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer may authorize such school to substitute any number of games in any classification or region to qualify for

championship consideration, provided that any such request for substitution of game or games shall be submitted to the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer prior to September 1st.

- e. In a case where a school is assigned to a region after the region has been determined (i. e., a school beginning football) any games played with that school will count but in case the region is less than eight teams it will not increase the minimum number of games for that region until the year following the assignment of the new school.
- Item (9) Reclassification for football is provided in Item 2 of this section. Following notice of reclassification each region will call a meeting for scheduling purposes. Such meeting will not be set prior to January 1, 1958, nor later than February 15, 1958. No school in the region may schedule any football game beyond the season of 1957 prior to the regional meeting. Any contract with team outside of the region and classification extending beyond the 1957 season may be voided, if necessary, to complete the regional schedule. (NOTE: All schools are urged to work towards adjusting of contracts so that no two-year contracts will extend beyond the odd calendar season. This will do much toward simplifying the making of regional schedules.)
- Item (10) In any case where two teams have played each other more than once during the season, only the first game played shall count in the regional standings. (Exception—a tie among more than two teams.)
- Item (11) The State Football Committee shall be composed of one member from each region of each classification and the State Officers of the Georgia High School Association. The member from each region of each classification shall be elected by the schools of the respective region.

The terms of the members of the State Football Committee shall be for two years. The members from the even numbered regions shall be elected in the Spring of the even numbered years and the members from the odd numbered region shall be elected in the Spring of the odd numbered years.

In case a vacancy occurs in any region for any reason, the region is authorized to fill the unexpired term at the next meeting of the region after the vacancy occurs.

The officers of the State Football Committee will be a Chairman and a Secretary who will be elected from the Membership of the State Football Committee by the Committee. The officers so elected shall serve until their terms of office on the committee expire. In case a vacancy occurs in either or both offices, the vacancy shall be filled at the first meeting of the State Football Committee following such vacancy.

The State Officers of the Georgia High School Association shall be ex-officio members of the State Football Committee but with no vote. The State Executive Secretary-Treasurer will assist the Secretary of the committee in taking minutes and will mail a copy of such minutes to each member of the committee after the minutes have been checked by the Secretary of the Committee and the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer.

The State Executive Secretary-Treasurer shall be responsible for notifying each member of the State Football Committee of the time and the place of any meeting of the State Football Committee.

Item (12) The State Football Committee shall set the Regional Divisions for each classification.

Item (13) For the seasons 1956 and 1957 the regional and sectional playoffs shall be as follows:

AAA, AA, A, B, and C—Region 1 vs Region 2
Region 3 vs Region 4
Winners to meet in final

Item (14) All football games played by member schools of the Georgia High School Association must be played under the football rules as adopted by the National Football Rules Committee of the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations.

Item (15) There shall be no inter-school practice and/or scrimmage in football.

Item (16) Spring football practice shall be limited to a period of 4 consecutive calendar weeks (28 consecutive calendar days) and must be concluded prior to June 1st.

Item (17) No football practice may be held prior to the beginning date set for the respective season. For the 1956 season the beginning date is August 20, 1956. For the 1957 season the beginning date is August 19, 1957.

- Item (18) The maximum number of games that a school may schedule in its regular schedule must be limited to ten games. This limitation of ten games in the regular schedule shall not include play-off games.
- Item (19) The regular schedule of any school must end by Saturday following Thanksgiving Day. (4th Thursday.) (Exception: For the 1956 season, due to the fact that there are five Thursdays in November, the regular schedule must end by Saturday, December 1, 1956.)
- Item (20) In case of a tie in the state final championship game the two tying teams will be declared co-champions.
- Item (21) In case of a tie in any playoff game—sub-regional, regional, or sectional—preceding the final state championship game the following point system will be used as to determine the winner:
- 1 point will be allowed for the team that has made the most penetrations of the opponents 20-yard line during the game.
- 1 point will be allowed for the team that has the greater number of first downs during the game.
- 1 point will be allowed for the team that has the greater net yardage during the game.
- If the teams are still tied after the application of this system, the winner will be the team with the greater net yardage.
- (NOTE: Whenever the application of this system is necessary the points allowed are added to those scored in the game to determine final score.)
- Item (22) All football games will be played with a minimum of four officially dressed football officials who are registered under the Georgia High School Association plan for the registration of officials, or with the State Association of another state. Violation of this rule shall be treated as a violation of eligibility rules as provided in Section 7, Item 4.
- Item (23) No high school shall belong to any other football organization than that to which assigned by the Georgia High School Association and be eligible for membership in the Georgia High School Association.
- Item (24) Playoff Regulations:

Date: Playoffs between regions shall be held the first week-end following Saturday after Thanksgiving Day. (Exception—for the 1956 season the playoffs between regions will be the week-end of December 8, 1956.)

State Finals will be held the 2nd week-end following Saturday after Thanksgiving Day. (Exception—for the 1956 season the State Finals will be the week-end of December 15, 1956.)

In any case where two teams have completed their schedules and are to meet in the playoffs, they may play at an earlier date than that set for the playoffs by agreement of the two schools concerned and with the approval of the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer.

Location:

Region Playoffs—

In the odd numbered calendar year, the odd numbered region will be the home or host team. In the even numbered calendar year, the even numbered region will be the home or host team. The home or host team will designate the site of the game.

State Finals—

1. Location of the State Final game may be set by agreement of the two schools concerned to play on the home field of one of the schools or to play on a neutral field. In any case where there is no agreement, there shall be a toss of a coin and the winner of the toss shall designate the location.
2. The schools of any classification, if they so see fit, may by a two-thirds vote of those schools present at a meeting prior to the football season, designate or set the location of State Final Championship game for that classification. (For 1956, in Class AAA, the Southern division winner will be the home or host school and will designate the site of the championship game.)

Finances:

1. If played on the home field of one of the two schools:

- a. Visiting team shall receive as a minimum \$2.00 per mile one way to be charged against the expenses of the game.
 - b. Net gate receipts after expenses of the game have been deducted shall be divided equally between the two teams. (Net gate receipts equals all receipts minus all expenses. Concessions and programs will not be included in receipts.)
 - c. Broadcasting and/or televising of the game may be permitted at no charge if the program is a sustaining program. If the program is commercial, a minimum of 30% of the charges made for the program shall be paid for the privilege of broadcasting and/or televising which shall be added to the receipts of the game.
 - d. In lieu of the financial arrangements in a and b, the visiting team may elect to receive a flat guarantee.
2. If played on a neutral field:
 - a. Same financial terms shall apply as above, with the competing teams dividing the gate receipts as in b and/or either team having the privilege of exercising the option as in d.
 3. Item 3, Section 3 of the By-Laws shall apply to all football playoffs, except that the 10% of the gross gate receipts shall be remitted direct to the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer.

Officials:

1. Shall come from the list of officials registered with the Georgia High School Association or with the State Association of another state.
2. Shall not come from any official's association nor from officials in town of either competing team unless mutually agreeable.
3. If mutual agreement can be reached as to officials, selection will be on the agreement of the schools concerned; if agreement cannot be reached, the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer will select the officials.

4. Officials fees for all Sub-Regional, Regional, and State playoff games:
 - a. Mileage on basis of 10c per mile one way. (To be paid for one car if officials are from the same location; to be paid for two cars if officials are from different locations and it is not feasible to travel in the same car.)
 - b. Receipts under \$2000.....\$15.00 per official
 Receipts \$2000.00 to \$4000.00 \$25.00 per official
 Receipts \$4000.00 to \$6000.00..\$50.00 per official
 Receipts over \$6000.00.....\$75.00 per official
 (These fees are on the basis of four officials. In any case where a clock operator is used the fee for the clock operation shall be \$12.50 or one-half the amount paid to each official, whichever is the greater.)
 - c. Receipts in calculating officials fees shall be the gross receipts minus any tax to which the game may be liable.

Trophies:

1. A school trophy will be awarded to each Region winner, each Sectional winner, each State runner-up, and each State winner.
2. Twenty-five (25) silver footballs will be awarded to each loser in the semi-finals and in the State finals.
3. Twenty-five (25) gold footballs will be awarded to the winner in the State finals.

BASKETBALL

Sec. 7.

- Item (1) No school may play more than thirty games of basketball during the basketball season. Participation in an approved basketball tournament other than District, Region or State elimination series shall count as two games.
 (This does not include District, Region and State Tournament.)
- Item (2) With the exception of playing in a County Tournament, the basketball season ends for a team when that team is eliminated from play in district, region or state tournament, or wins the state tournament.
- Item (3) A school may permit its basketball teams to enter only

such tournaments as have been authorized according to the rules and regulations of the Georgia High School Association.

- Item (4) All boys basketball games shall be played by the rules as published by the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations.
- Item (5) All girls basketball games shall be played by the rules as published by the Girls National Basketball Rules Committee for Secondary Schools.
- Item (6) Where two basketball teams have the same color jerseys it shall be the duty of the home team to change colors in the interest of good sportsmanship. In tournaments where two teams have the same colors, both schools shall change.
- Item (7) The officials in all games shall have complete control over all features of the game. In District, Region and State Tournaments, the Committee or person in charge of the tournament shall secure the services of a competent scorer and a competent timer. No team shall have the privilege of placing their scorer and/or timer to check the official scorer and/or timer at or near the position occupied by the official scorer and official timer. Often official scorers and official timers are materially hindered by others nearby.
- Item (8) A school may enter its basketball team in only one approved tournament in addition to the district or region tournament. (The State Tournament is considered as a continuation of the District or Region Tournament in which a school participates.)
- Item (9) Item 3, Section 3, of the By-Laws shall apply to all sanctioned basketball tournaments except that the 5% of the gross gate receipts shall be remitted direct to the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer by the school to which the sanction was given.
- Item (10) All basketball games shall be played with officially dressed basketball official or officials who are registered under the Georgia High School Association plan for registration of officials, or with the State Association of another state. Violation of this rule shall be treated as a violation of eligibility rules as provided in Section 7, Item 4.

Item (11) The number of entries in the various State Basketball Tournaments shall be as follows:

Class AAA Boys—the first four teams from each region

Class AAA Girls—the first two teams from each region.

Class AA Boys—the first two teams from each region.

Class AA Girls—the first two teams from each region.

Class A Boys—the first two teams from each region.

Class A Girls—the first two teams from each region.

Class B Boys—each district shall have one representative for each 13 member schools or major fraction.

Class B Girls—each district shall have one representative for each 13 member schools or major fraction.

Class C Boys—each district shall have one representative for each 16 member schools or major fraction.

Class C Girls—each district shall have one representative for each 16 member schools or major fraction.

State, District and Region Meets

LITERARY EVENTS

Sec. 1. The State Executive Committee and each District and Region Committee working under the rules and regulations set out in the Constitution and By-Laws of the Association shall have entire charge of the operation of their respective meets, the selection of judges and officials for each event. They shall:

- Item (1) Provide a time keeper in each event in which there is a time limit to be observed. It shall be the duty of the time keeper to keep an accurate account of the time contestant is consuming. Each timekeeper shall be provided with a stopwatch, and time shall be called for each contestant when the time is reached. A contestant shall not be disqualified if the contestant stops promptly when time is called.
- Item (2) Provide one judge to three judges in the various events, and give the judge or judges a written copy of the rules concerning the judging of that event as set out in the section and item dealing with that particular event.
- Item (3) Provide programs for each contestant so that they may know where and when to appear for a contest.
- Item (4) Use in District and Region literary contests the same type of score sheets that are used in the literary contests in the State Meet. The State Office will furnish each district and region with a supply of these score sheets.

Sec. 2. In all State Literary Contests in which there are more than two contestants, a rating system of judging will be used so that conference of judges to determine winners may be eliminated.

Sec. 3. Each contest shall be judged on merit according to points set out as essential for judging that contest. The age or size of the contestant shall have no influence in reaching a decision.

Sec. 4. The presiding official in any contest will not by word of mouth, gesture, or any other change of expression, or in any manner indicate approval or disapproval of the manner which a contestant presents material.

Sec. 5. All mistakes due to error of arithmetic or made contrary to the rules of the contest, and discovered before or after the decision of the judges, shall be corrected. In the use of score sheets for judges there shall be no column in which the judges may tabulate the result.

Sec. 6.

Item (1) **DECLAMATION, BOYS AND GIRLS**

Separate contests in Declamation will be held for boys and girls. Declamation is a contest of delivery. It should be an oration worthy of a high school pupil. The subject matter of the declamation should be serious in tone and delivered for the purpose of informing, convincing, and persuading the audience. All purely funny pieces, dramatic readings, and impersonations are barred from consideration. No accessories such as costumes or music will be allowed. The judges will take into consideration the following: (1) sincerity, (2) earnestness, (3) force, (4) voice, (5) polish, (6) grace, and (7) effectiveness of delivery.

The declamation shall not be over eight minutes in length. The judges shall select a first, second, third, and fourth place winner.

Item (2) **PIANO**

Each contestant will be allowed ten minutes in which to play two selections. One selection must be taken from Group I, and one selection must be taken from Group II.

The judges will take into consideration the following:

1. Accuracy (Notes and Time Value)
2. Technique (Fingering, Faculty, Appropriateness)
3. Rhythm (Steadiness, Tempo, Freedom)
4. Interpretation (Understanding of composition, Expression marks, Contrast, General effect)
5. Presentation (Stage deportment, Poise, Stage personality)

The judges shall select a first, second, third and fourth place winner.

Item (3) ONE ACT PLAY

No more than eight persons may be used in the cast, although parts may be doubled. Plays with immoral subjects will receive no consideration by the judges. No play may be more than 35 minutes in length. The District or Region Secretary must file an official entry for the play winning first place with the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer at the time as listed under dates for tournaments and meets.

The judges shall select a first, second, third and fourth place winner.

The scoring of points shall be twelve points for first place; nine points, second place; six points, third place; and three points, fourth place.

Each school wishing to enter the One Act Play must notify the District or Region Secretary in writing not later than December 1 of its intention to enter the One Act Play for the current year.

NOTE: THE DRAMA LOAN LIBRARY at the Center for Continuing Education, University of Georgia, Athens, Georgia, is a fine source of help for all teachers of Speech and Drama in the public schools.

A special service is maintained with the cooperation of the publishers who send reading copies to the library, as new plays come off the press. The collection now contains about 4,000 titles, including one-act and full-length plays. For the mailing fee of 35c a school may borrow 6 plays at one time. If a school does not have the Drama Loan Library's catalog, write for a copy.

A list of recommended one-act titles will be issued in the early Fall. This will be mailed to a school upon request.

Item (4) **ESSAY, BOYS AND GIRLS**

(a) Subject and Contestants: The State President shall select five subjects from current topics discussed in newspapers and magazines as the basis for the Essay Contest.

The subjects must be sent in a sealed envelope to the District or Region Secretary, said seal to be broken in the presence of the contestants after having assembled in the room for the contest.

The contestants, one boy and one girl from each school, may write upon any of the five subjects selected, an essay not exceeding 600 words. The essay shall be written in ink. Two hours will be given for writing the essay. The contestants must not receive any coaching during the contest.

(b) How judged: Verbal and grammatical correctness, spelling, and punctuation shall be considered of less importance than the interest and general effectiveness of the whole composition but should have weight. The essay shall be judged by the thought, the order, arrangement, and by the elements of style. It is a ready writer's contest and evidence of prememorized compositions shall weigh heavily against the contestants. Boys' essays and Girls' essays will be graded separately and separate awards will be given. The judges shall select a first, second, third and fourth place winner.

(c) Essays sent: The first place essay in each district and region shall be sent by the District or Region Secretary just as

handed to the Committee of the District or Region contest, with the name on a separate sheet, to the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer, at the time that the report is made to the State Executive Secretary Treasurer of the winners of the District or Region Meet. The District and Region winners in the Essay do not come to the State Meet for further contests. The State winners are determined from the winning papers sent in by the district and regions.

Item (5) **SPELLING**

(a) The State Executive Secretary-Treasurer each year shall send, securely sealed, to the District or Region Secretary as many lists of words as the District or Region may have schools entering the contest. The list will consist of 100 words to be spelled by the senior class of said schools on the last Wednesday in March. A senior is any student in his final year of high school who has earned a minimum of eleven (11) Carnegie units on the first day of the school year. A minimum of 80 per cent of the words will be selected from the spellers on the State Textbook list; the remaining words will be selected from current news publications.

(b) How conducted: The District or Region Executive Committee or through its secretary shall appoint for each contesting school a visiting examiner to conduct the contest in each school, said examiner being a Superintendent or Principal of some member school or his representative. The District or Region Secretary shall send by mail to the Superintendent or the Principal of the school participating in the contest, the sealed list of words. The outside envelope shall be addressed to the Superintendent or the Principal of the participating school; the inside envelope shall contain the sealed list of words and the District or Region Secretary shall write the name of the visiting examiner on the outside of this envelope. The envelope with the sealed list of words is not to be opened by any person other than the visiting examiner or his representative. The material may be registered if the district or region so sees fit; however, it is not mandatory. The visiting examiner is directed to select two assistants from the faculty in the school where the examination is being held to assist him in conducting the examination. The local spelling teacher may give out the words to the class. Definitions of words may be given.

The visiting examiner shall examine the Senior Class Attendance register or registers and shall from this information certify the number of students listed in the Senior Class, and he shall give the name of each pupil shown as withdrawn, including the date of withdrawal and the reason for withdrawal.

The examiner shall make a written report of the result of the examination on the report enclosed with the list of spelling words with such report being signed by the examiner and his assistants. It shall be sealed and mailed to the District or Region Secretary

on the same day on which the examination is held together with all of the examination papers and with such written explanation of absence as may be submitted to him. No excuse for absence other than a doctor's certificate will be accepted, except in the case of extraordinary providential hinderance such as death in the family or some similar circumstances. One hundred words must be counted off for each unexcused absence. Any medical certificates excusing a pupil from the contest shall be filed with the District or Region Secretary within forty-eight (48) hours of the day of the contest.

Every examination not held according to these rules and regulations will be disqualified.

(c) Winning papers: The District or Region Committee may review the reports and papers sent in. The District or Region Secretary shall send to the State Office the average of all schools in his district or region and the papers of the winning school. The State Executive Secretary-Treasurer is authorized to review or regrade the papers or to have same done. The District, Region, or State Secretary shall from the data award first, second, third, and fourth places according to whether it is a District, Region or State Contest.

(d) All spelling papers must be written in ink. One hundred errors must be counted off for each paper not written in ink. In correcting papers count as errors the following:

1. All words so poorly written you cannot read them.
2. All words written as "i" over an "e".
3. All words which show erasure and/or changes.
4. All words erased and/or crossed out and rewritten.
5. All words which are not numbered to agree with the number of the word as given out by the examiner.
6. All words omitted.

(e) Each school wishing to enter the Spelling must notify the District or Region Secretary in writing not later than March 15 of its intention to enter Spelling for the current year.

Item (6) **DEBATE**

Each school wishing to enter debate must notify the District or Region Secretary in writing not later than December 1 of its intention to enter debates for the current year.

Elimination on District and Regional levels will be conducted by one of the following plans as the District or Region may direct:

- (1) The District or Region Secretary shall group the schools entering into two circles according to geographical arrangement by January 5th, and notify each school concerning the groupings. Each school so grouped shall present two

teams or debaters, one team on the affirmative and one team on the negative, with the affirmative team debating at home and the negative team away from home.

- (2) The District or Region Secretary shall group the schools entering into two circles by January 5th and notify each school concerning the groupings. Each school so grouped shall present two teams of debaters, one team on the affirmative and one team on the negative. All schools in the same circle shall meet at the same place at a time set by the District or Region.
- (3) In any District or Region in which there are four or less schools in the debate, these may be grouped in one circle which will be the final debate.

Where a school drops out, consolidations are to be made by the District or Region Secretary and schools must be ready to meet any assigned contestants on the date for debate. Should all schools but one in a circle fail to debate, that school shall be declared the winner of the circle and be entitled to represent the school at the District or Region final debate. If only two schools remain in a circle, these debate on a dual plan. The winners of the respective circles meet in the District or Region finals on a dual debate plan with the affirmative team of each school meeting the negative team of the other school.

Any school entering debate and dropping out without giving notice to the District or Region Secretary at least three days prior to the date of the debate shall not be allowed to enter any other literary event during that school year.

(a) Order of speeches: At all contests, time and order of speeches shall be as follows:

MAIN SPEECHES

First affirmative speaker	10 minutes
First negative speaker	10 minutes
Second affirmative speaker	10 minutes
Second negative speaker	10 minutes

PREPARATION OF REBUTTAL

Time for preparation of rebuttal shall be given. The maximum time shall be limited to ten minutes. By unanimous consent of all participants in the debate, less time for the preparation of the rebuttal may be used and the debate continued.

REBUTTAL SPEECHES

First negative speaker	4 minutes
First affirmative speaker	4 minutes
Second negative speaker	4 minutes
Second affirmative speaker	4 minutes

Speakers on respective sides must speak in the same order in rebuttals as in main speech.

(b) For 1956-57 the debate subject will be:

Resolve: That the federal government should sustain the prices of major agricultural products at not less than 90% of parity.

(c) District and Regional Debates: All of the preliminary debates in the various districts and regions shall be held on January 10 and 11 at such hours as may be agreed upon or at such time as may be set by the District or Region. In case of a tie in a circle the tie must be settled not later than January 14. The winning school in each circle will be entitled to compete in the district or region final. The district or region final must be completed not later than January 17. Should there be a tie in the district or region final the contest must be continued or reheld until a representative for the State contest is determined. In case of a tie in the district or region final the points towards the literary trophy shall be equally divided between the tied schools. The continued or reheld contest shall carry no points but is held merely to determine the representative of the district or region to the State contest.

(d) Judging and Scoring: In every debate there shall be three judges. A copy of instructions shall be given to each judge. In selecting the winners, the vote of each judge shall count 1, a perfect score making 6 points. A school is not eliminated as long as it *wins both decisions in its circle.*

(e) Instructions to Judges: The judges shall vote from their places without conference. Judges are to consider both the constructive and the rebuttal speeches, and should regard proof, organization, refutation and delivery of the constructive speech; and the analysis, refutation and delivery of the rebuttal speech.

The judges will select the best team of debaters by rating the best team as Number 1, and the losing team as Number 2. In addition the Judges will give each speaker a percentile score.

As a basis for marking the judges will use the following:

Organization and proof	50
Analysis and refutation	30
Delivery	20

Each judge will be furnished a blank ballot similar to the following:

Team Number 1

Affirmative Team:

1st speaker's score

2nd speaker's score

Negative Team:

1st speaker's score

2nd speaker's score

Judge's signature

At the close of the debate each judge shall indicate his choice by ballot and deliver it to the presiding officer. In district and region debates the presiding officer shall inspect the ballots in the presence of a representative of each school and announce the result. In the State debates the ballots in each individual debate shall be sealed and delivered to the Chairman in charge of the State debates. After all of the debate envelopes have been turned in to the Chairman, he shall forward them to State meet office, where the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer or his representative shall, in the presence of representatives from the competing schools, open the envelopes, read aloud the ballots, make an official tabulation of the results, and announce the results.

(f) Coaching: Coaching is necessary, but does not mean writing speeches. Coaching shall be limited to (a) instruction in the art of debating in general; (b) help in the collection of material bearing on the subject; (c) advice, suggestions, directions, criticism, outlines, and English as in regular class room work; (d) drill on delivery. The coaching must be done by a teacher of the school and not by outside parties. Each school will observe these general principles of honesty for the sake of the pupils.

(g) In all contests the debaters shall be separated from the audience and shall receive no coaching while the debate is in progress.

(h) No speaker may be interrupted during the main speech or rebuttal, nor may any speaker utilize any time other than that allotted for main speech and rebuttal. For violation of this provision, the presiding officer shall forfeit the debate to opponents.

(i) Teams: The teams constituting the debating team from a given school may not change from one team to another or change from affirmative to negative or vice versa, in order to give the school a stronger representation on that side of the debate. Each

school must be represented by the same debaters or alternate at the District, Region, and State debates that represented the school for the first circle and on the same side of the question that they originally represented.

(j) At the State debates, the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer shall arrange the districts or region winners into two circles in each class with approximately the same number of schools in the respective class in each circle, these to be designated as Circle 1 and Circle 2. (Exception—if there are four or less schools in the State debate in any class these may be arranged in one circle which will be the final debate.) The winning school in Circle 1 will meet the winning school in Circle 2 for the State Championship. In case of a tie between schools in the same circle for first place in that circle, the schools tied shall debate off the tie, each school furnishing two teams. Both teams of the winning school in each circle will be entitled to contest in the final debate, and the school scoring the most points in the final debate shall be declared the winner. Should there be a tie in the final debate a co-championship will be declared.

Item (7) **MALE QUARTET**

In District, Region, and State meets the quartet contest will be a male quartet. Each quartet will be limited to eight minutes. Not more than two selections may be presented by each quartet. Quartet may be with or without accompanist. The judges will select a first, second, third and fourth place winner.

A Male Quartet shall consist of four voices and carry the following distinct harmony parts: (1) first tenor, (2) second tenor, (3) first bass, (4) second bass. Unless these four harmony parts are heard the group will not be considered by the judges.

Item (8) **TYPING, BOYS AND GIRLS**

Separate contests in typing will be held for boys and girls. The contest is open to pupils of any grade level in high school. A boy and a girl may represent a school. This contest will be a straight copy contest in speed and accuracy and will be graded on the basis of International Typing rules as published by the Gregg Publishing Company. Each contestant will be required to type for a period of ten minutes. Each contestant will be given the same copy to transcribe.

Each contestant is responsible for furnishing the typewriter which is to be used in the contest. An electric typewriter may not be used.

The judges will select a first, second, third and fourth place winner.

Item (9) VOCAL SOLO, BOYS AND GIRLS

In District, Region and State Meets there will be a contest in vocal solo for boys and a contest in vocal solo for girls. Each contestant will be limited to seven minutes. Not more than two selections may be presented by each contestant. Vocal solo may be with or without accompanist. The judges will select a first, second third and fourth place winner.

Item (10) HOME ECONOMICS

The contest in Home Economics will be in the general area of home management with special emphasis on Times and Energy Management: Planning, Initiating, and Carrying Out Activities Related to the Conservation of the Homemaker's Time and Energy.

Each contestant will:

1. Take a written objective test related to planning, initiating, and carrying out activities which conserve the homemaker's time and energy.
2. Present and orally explain some evidences of a project she has undertaken related to time and energy management.

The oral explanation should be made without notes and within a 6 minutes time limit; no person may help the contestant present the oral explanation to the judges. Each contestant should plan, initiate, and carry out a project in which she assumes responsibility for conserving time and energy of the homemaker. She should prepare and bring to the contest some evidences of the project she has undertaken; a clear statement of the name of the project, the objectives she hoped to accomplish, the steps in carrying out her project, what she learned, some statements about the results of her project. The evidence might be prepared and summarized in a notebook, in a project report, through a series of pictures, color slides, posters, or a felt board. A few project suggestions are:

1. Arrange the family kitchen for efficiency and attractiveness (or a unit kitchen in the homemaking department): study the food preparations your family carry on in the kitchen, study the food preparations carried on by different family members, designate work centers appropriate to preparations and family members. Gather together, secure, and arrange the equipment appropriate to each center.
2. Arrange house cleaning equipment for proper storage and efficiency (at your home or in the homemaking department): study bulletins and texts on equipment needed for house cleaning, gather together this equipment, organize a closet or a section of a closet or spaces to accommodate the material and equipment, label the space and place all house cleaning equipment in its proper space.

3. Arrange your clothes closet for space saving and efficiency: study the clothing items that need to be stored in your closet; design an efficient closet to fit your needs; build in or otherwise provide appropriate space for storage of winter clothes, storage of shoes, hats, blouses, skirts, etc., plan to keep everything in its place.
4. Arrange a laundry unit for your family (or in the home-making department): study the washing and ironing operations of your family, plan for more efficiency in this operation; place equipment in appropriate places or make suitable adjustments; gather together all small washing and ironing equipment; plan for their storage.
5. Help your family share housekeeping responsibilities: study the housekeeping operation of your family (daily, weekly, monthly), help them make a time schedule for doing jobs; help them choose jobs that are appropriate; live by the schedule; readjust the schedule; help each person to have a job and to do his job efficiently and well.
6. Teach yourself to manage your time well: study your own daily activities, keep a record of how you spend your time for a week; study your record, make a schedule for yourself to include time for all your activities; follow your schedule.
7. Teach yourself to use your study and work time efficiently: study your own daily schedule and work habits; keep a record of when you study and when you do chores; consult some authorities about efficient ways to study; improve your study habits; consult some authorities about efficient ways to do your chores; improve your work habits.
8. Improve your skill in some housekeeping activity: make a detailed study of some housekeeping activity, make a chart to show time and motion involved, try to improve arrangements for conserving time and motion. Practice conservation of time and motion.

(Note: While the feminine pronoun is used in connection with the Home Economics contest, the contest is open to boys as well as girls.)

Item (11) **SHORTHAND**

The contest in Shorthand in District, Region, and State Meets will consist of dictation and transcription. Rate of dictation will be 90 words per minute with total dictation time from five to fifteen minutes. Contestants will be allowed 60 minutes for transcription. Contestants are expected to furnish own notebook and typewriter.

The contest is open to both boys and girls of any grade level in high school.

Contest will be judged on the finished product which will include accuracy in the transcribed material and the observance of International Typing rules in transcription.

Judges will select a first, second, third and fourth place winner.

Item (12) **GIRLS TRIO**

In District, Region, and State Meets there will be a contest in Girls Trio. A girls' trio shall consist of three female voices carry-

ing three distinct harmony parts, namely: first soprano, second soprano, and alto. (Referred to in music as S. S. A). Three harmony parts must be heard in order for the group to be considered by the judges.

Each trio will be limited to eight minutes. Not more than two selections may be presented by each trio. Trio may be with or without accompanist.

Judges will select a first, second, third, and fourth place winner.

Sec. 7. LITERARY POINTS AND TROPHIES

- Item (1) The winners in boys' declamation, girls' declamation, boys' essay, girls' essay, piano, home economics, boys' quartet, boys' typing, girls' typing, boys' vocal solo, girls' vocal solo, shorthand, and girls' trio shall receive seven points for first place, five points for second place, three points for third place, and one point for fourth place towards winning the literary trophy in District, Region, and State Meets.
- Item (2) The winner of the debate in the District, Region or State Debate shall receive twelve points and the loser shall receive nine points towards winning the literary trophy. Each school not going to the finals in the District or Region shall receive points up to five according to the number of points received in the preliminary contest in debate. Each school not going to the finals in the State contest shall receive points up to five according to the number of points received in the circle debates.
- Item (3) One Act Play and Spelling in the District, Region, and State contests shall receive twelve points for first place, nine points for second place, six points for third place, and three points for fourth place towards winning the literary trophy.
- Item (4) Schools which finish 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th in total points in each classification in the State Meet will be awarded trophies. The District or Region which scores the most points in its classification in the State Meet will receive the high point District or Region trophy with the trophy going to the high point school in the winning district or region.

Sec. 8. NUMBER OF REPRESENTATIVES

- Item (1) A pupil may represent his or her school in not more than two events in which he or she performs alone. Pupils are not limited to the number of group events that they may enter.

- Item (2) Each school may have only one contestant in each of the following: boys' declamation, girls' declamation, piano, home economics, girls' essay, boys' essay, girls' typing, boys' typing, girls' vocal solo, boys' vocal solo, and shorthand.
- Item (3) The first place winner in each literary event in each District and Region qualifies to participate in the State Meet.

Sec. 9. TIES

In case of a tie for first place in any district or region literary event the contest must be continued or reheld until a representative to the State Meet is determined. In case of a tie in the first contest the points shall be divided equally between or among the tied contestants. The continued or reheld contest shall carry no points as it is held merely to determine the representative of the District or Region to the State Meet.

Sec. 10. SCORE SHEETS

Score sheets used in the State Meet in the various contests will be turned in to the chairman of the contest. The chairman will place these score sheets in a properly marked envelope, seal, and turn in to the State Meet office.

The envelope containing the score sheets will be opened by the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer or his representative, the result tabulated, and the winners announced. Each school which participated in the contest may have a faculty representative present at the time that the envelope is opened, tabulated and results announced.

Sec. 11. NOTICE OF ENTRY IN LITERARY EVENTS

Each school wishing to enter any literary event must notify the District or Region Secretary in writing. Notification of entry in Debate and/or One Act Play must be made not later than December 1. For all other Literary events notification of entry must be made not later than March 15, and the special list of Literary contestants must be filed in triplicate with the District or Region Secretary not later than April 1.

Sec. 12. LITERARY ELIGIBILITY REPORTS

Eligibility reports are required for all literary contestants just as for athletic contestants. Eligibility reports for Debates and One Act Plays are due not later than De-

ember 15; eligibility reports for all other Literary events are due not later than March 15. Any eligibility report for Debate and/or One Act Play filed after December 15 must be accompanied by a delayed fee of \$10.00 per report.

AUTO DRIVING CONTEST

- a. Auto Driving Contest will be a District, Region, and State event. The District and Region winners who will be certified to the State Office will be eligible to compete in the State Finals.
- b. Separate competition will be held for each classification.
- c. Each school will be entitled to one contestant in the respective district or region contest of its classification.
- d. The winner of each classification in District and Region will be entitled to compete in the State Final contest.
- e. Notification of entry must be made in writing not later than March 15. For Class AAA schools, notification is sent to Region Chairman; for Class AA and Class A schools, notification is sent to Region Secretary; for Class B and C schools, notification is sent to District Secretary.
- f. District and Region eliminations will be set by the respective Districts and Regions and will be held on April 8, 9, and 10, 1957; and reports of winners filed with the State Office not later than midnight, April 12, 1957. (Option of dates for District and Region elimination is given so that Districts and Regions can work out schedules to fit in with State Patrolmen.)
- g. The State Final contest will be held at Thomaston, Georgia, on April 24, 1957.
- h. In District and Region contest, contestants will be required to:
 1. Take a written test.
 2. Demonstrate the following driving skills:
Serpentine course; Parallel Parking; Straight Line Driving thru elevated balls, and Smooth Stop from minimum speed.
- i. In the State Final contest, contestants will be required to:
 1. Take a written test.
 2. Demonstrate various driving skills.

STATE ONE ACT PLAYS AND DEBATES

One Act Plays and Debate finals will be held at the University of Georgia, Athens, Georgia, on January 25 and 26, 1957, in conjunction with the Eighth Annual State Speech and Drama Festival.

Space in dormitories will be very limited as practically all space will be occupied by University students. Reservations for such dormitory space as may be available will be \$1.50 per person per day, and hotel reservations at \$2.00 per person per day, should be sent to Mr. J. Eugene Welden, Supervisor, Conferences and Short Courses, Georgia Center for Continuing Education, The University of Georgia, Athens, Georgia. Reservation blanks may be secured from your District or Region Secretary, the State Office, or Mr. Welden.

Meals can be secured at University dining halls at regular student rates. Space is provided on the reservation blank for reservation for the Annual Banquet at \$1.50 per person.

Entries in the One Act Plays are responsible for their own scenery, properties, costumes and make-up. It is impossible to provide locally all of the many items. In fairness to all contestants, the University Theatre cannot furnish scenery, properties, costume or make-up. The Fine Arts Auditorium and the Laboratory Theatre will not be available for practice by any school in the State Meet.

Lights——General lighting from front border in three colors, red, white, and blue; ante-proscenium spots:
Specific Spot lighting for three (3) areas down stage and two (2) areas up stage.
Any special lighting must be provided by group requiring it. Outlets only are available R, C and L. An electrician will be provided to operate cues when under the direction of a member of the group.

Sound——All records and cues are the responsibility of each school.
Outlets for electrical equipment such as record player or PA system will be furnished.

Dressing Rooms ——Boys will dress in make-up room and girls will dress in dressing room C. Both of these rooms are located off the corridor one level below stage. Costumes must be removed from dressing room at end of each play.

Storage ——It will not be possible to accomodate the scenery for more than three or four one-acts at the same time. A break has been planned between plays to allow for removal of scenery. Upon arrival, a member of each group should report to the Technical Assistant in the Trap Room for scheduling and allocation of space.

2. It is not necessary for any contestant to register at the office. The person in charge of each event has a list of the entries at the place where the contest is to be held. Contestants will report to the location of the contest.
3. Contestants will report to the location of the contest at least 15 minutes prior to the time the contest is scheduled to begin.
4. As soon as results are available, they will be posted on bulletin boards outside of the office.
5. When results are being tabulated in the office for any contest, a faculty representative of each school in that contest is invited to be present and to witness the tabulation.
6. Medals and certificates will be given for 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th places. These will be available at the office approximately one hour after the result of an event has been posted.
7. In any contest in which critical score sheets are used, any school may secure the critical sheet for its entry as soon as the results of the contest have been announced.
8. Contestants papers in typing, shorthand, and home economics will not be returned to contestants.

(c) The State final championship game shall be alternated between the North and South divisions of the State, with the Northern winner being the host or home team in the odd numbered calendar year and the Southern winner being the host or home team in the even numbered calendar year. For 1956 the Southern winner will be the home or host team and will designate the site of the championship game.

2. BASKETBALL—(BOYS)

(a) The State Basketball Tournament will be held in Atlanta, Georgia, in 1957.

(b) The tournament will be held under the sponsorship of the Georgia High School Association.

(c) Four teams will qualify from each region with each region determining its own representatives not later than Saturday preceding the tournament.

(d) The officials for the state tournament will be selected by the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer.

3. BASKETBALL—(GIRLS)

(a) Two teams will qualify from each region with each region determining its own representatives not later than February 25, 1957.

4. TRACK

(a) Eliminations will be by regions. In all track and field events, the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place finishers in each region will qualify for the State Meet with each region determining its qualifiers not later than April 27, 1957.

5. TENNIS

(a) Eliminations will be by regions with the 1st and 2nd place singles players in each region and the 1st and 2nd place doubles teams in each region qualifying for the State final tournament, with each region determining its qualifiers not later than May 4, 1957. (This applies to both girls and boys tennis.)

6. GOLF

- (a) Eliminations will be by regions with the 1st and 2nd place teams (four men to each team) in each region qualifying for the State final tournament.
- (b) The low scoring individual (medalist) and the 2nd low scoring individual (runner-up) in each region, qualify for the State final tournament even if not on a team qualifying from a region.
- (c) Each region will determine its qualifiers not later than May 4, 1957.

7. BASEBALL

- (a) Each region will determine its own region champion provided that such is determined by the deadline dates set in this bulletin.
- (b) Plans for the State playoffs will be announced by the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer.

8. MEETINGS

- (a) There will be three regular meetings each year of Class AAA, District-at-Large.
- (b) The first regular meeting will be held at noon on the date of the Tech-Georgia football game at such place as may be designated by the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer. (This meeting will be held at noon at Stegeman Hall, University of Georgia, Athens Georgia on the date of the 1956 Tech-Georgia football game.)
- (c) The second regular meeting will be held at noon on the day of the semi-finals of the Boys State AAA Basketball tournament at such place as may be designated by the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer.
- (d) The third regular meeting will be held at the time of the Spring State Meet at such time and place as may be designated by the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer. (This meeting will be held at 11:00 a. m. at Stegeman Hall, University of Georgia, Athens, Georgia, on May 4, 1957.
- (e) Special meetings as may be necessary may be called by the President of Class AAA, District-at-Large, by written notice to each school through the office of the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer.
- (f) Any proposed legislation is to be presented by the second regular meeting and action on such legislation will be taken at the third regular meeting.
